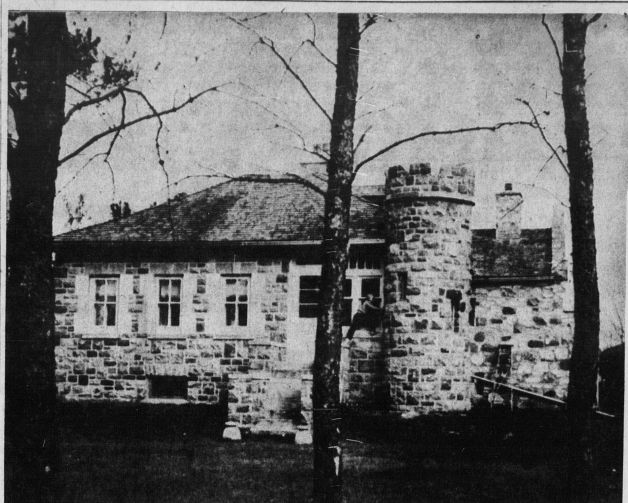

Castle Offered For Sale On Back Road In Manitoba

By FRED CHAFFE WINNIPEG (CP) — Want a six-room stone castle in the seclusion of a rural back road, with interior decoration by an accomplished artist and the comfort of oil heat?

Mrs. William Stark may have what you're looking for. And the price is under \$10,000, including 200 acres of land.

She can vouch for the workmanship. Her late husband built it painstakingly, stone by stone. Her artist brother did the interior decoration and dozens of his paintings hang on the walls.

The 1½-storey castle complete with turret is a striking sight to motorists who pass the site on the cattle and grain-growing country east of Lake Manitoba and 120 miles northwest of Winnipeg.

Mrs. Stark, a sprightly 71, has lived there alone since her husband's death more than a year ago. She put the house on the market after deciding to

move to Ontario and live with a sister.

FINISHED IN 1944 It was a reluctant move. Mrs. Stark, a native of Aberdeen, a Scottish immigrant homesteader in 1920.

Construction with native granite from the Stark's land and surrounding country, began a few years after that and the final stone was set in place in 1944.

A plaque on one wall identifies the castle as "Glenora, built in spare time by W. Stark, stonemason and farmer, homesteader 1911."

It wasn't an easy job, Mrs. Stark recalls. "He did it when he could, whenever he could get the time. We had a herd of cattle—he milked some and I milked the rest. Those were the hard days when we got \$15 for a cow and \$5 for a calf."

"There was a lot of stone originally but my husband dismantled it piece by piece and replaced it with stone. Some people ask me whether he didn't just put the stone over the logs but it isn't so."

PANELLED LIVING ROOM The artist's touch is everywhere inside. Window ledges are colored with paint applied with a turkey feather, so skillfully finished they are almost impossible to distinguish from pink marble. The living room is beamed and panelled with hand-painted trim in baronial style.

This is the work of Mrs. Stark's brother, the late Brodie Crawford, an artist who specialized in church decorations.

Among his most noted works are a series of hand-painted symbolic shields in St. Paul's Anglican cathedral in London, Ont.

work for churches until his death 10 years later. His paintings are being sold separately. "I posed as a nun for one of his paintings," Mrs. Stark recalls.

Now she plans to return to Toronto where she first moved from Aberdeen as a girl of 20 to live with her brother, at about the same time her husband was leaving Kirkfield Bank in Lanarkshire to homestead, work as a mason when he could, and carve his own monument out of the Manitoba bush and grassland.

Reds Use Berlin Wall In Propaganda Mills

By GEORGE BULLWOOD BERLIN (AP) — For more than a year, the Communists shied away from direct mention of their wall through Berlin. Now they are losing some of their inhibitions on the awkward subject. They are starting to build it into their propaganda.

When the wall was begun, Communist writers went into verbal contortions to avoid naming it. Instead of calling a wall a wall they said it was "the protection of our national frontiers" or "the defensive measures of August 13"—clumsy expressions for anyone in a hurry.

Now the propagandists have changed their line. They have found a suitable term to describe the wall. They call it "our anti-Fascist defensive rampart."

Hardly a day passes without ADN, the official East German news agency, reporting a group of distinguished visitors inspecting the "rampart."

Once they would have been kept away. But now they are taken up to the Brandenburg Gate to gaze at the wall, the wire and tank traps.

The Communists appear to steer their visitors away from such heart-rending sights as

Bernaerstrasse, where apartment blocks are bricked up and the Potsdamerplatz, where the once busy heart of downtown Berlin has been turned into a concrete desert.

RECENT VISITORS A French Communist senator, an Australian labor leader and a group of Lutheran bishops from Eastern Europe were among recent sightseers on the east side of the wall.

Usually they are quoted as making statements like that of the French senator, Georges Cognat: "In the name of the working population of Paris I can say that this rampart pleases them. The French people are for peace and this rampart is a rampart of peace."

Pictures of them are taken and published in the Communist press. Usually, however, these shots do not show the wall itself—an ugly object in anyone's picture. But the distinguished guest is shown with the Brandenburg Gate in the background. The photographer stands with his back to the wall.

The reason for the Communist propaganda line is not clear. It may have been decided that the wall was so obvious that the Communists only made themselves ridiculous by ignoring it.
