TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

RIOTING.

Militia Called Out—Shots Fired.

COOKSHIRE, Que., Sept. 27. When the military, consisting of seven companies of the 38th Batt., reached Sawyerville this morning, they were met by 200 armed Italians, who marched defiantly by, waving clubs and making gesticulations. Shortly afterwards the rioters removed some of the rails a hundred yards in the rear of the train, but they were easily driven off by the militia, and the rails relaid. Sawyerville is protected by thirty cavalry men. Six shots were fired at Auctioneer Taylor on his last night while he was on the way home. Several leading rioters who were interviewed declared that the men were desperate, having been robbed and being now without food, and if funds were not forthcoming violence would occur. So far, there has been no loss of life in connexion with the riot.

Knights of Pythias Celebrate.

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 27. Moncton presented a gay appearance to-day during the occasion of the Knights of Pythias demonstration and annual meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces. Lodges from St. John, St. Stephen and Spring Hill were met at the depot at noon and escorted by the local Lodge to the Opera House, where addresses of welcome were tendered by Mayor McKenzie on behalf of the town, and Rev. J. G. Campbell on behalf of the local Lodge. They were responded to by James Moulson, Grand Chancellor. The latter was then presented by the St. John Knights with a handsome gold watch and chain, valued at \$200, on his retirement from office. The visitors were then escorted to hotels, and in the afternoon a procession of upwards of three hundred Knights paraded the principal streets of the town, music being furnished by the bands from Spring Hill, Moncton and St. John.

Grand Chancellor Moulson opened the second annual session of the Grand Lodge, in Pythian Temple, to-night, when fourteen past Chancellors received the Grand Lodge degree. The annual reports of Grand Chancellor, Grand Master of Exchequer and Grand Keeper, of Records and Seal were read and adopted. Officers were elected and the Grand Lodge adjourned till Friday.

A GREAT RACE. BLACK PILOT BEATEN.

TRURO, Sept. 27. A great race, Elmo first, Telephone second, Black Pilot third and Rattler fourth. Best time 2.31. Exhibition closes to-morrow.

ANOTHER DISPATCH. Thousands of people witnessed the horse races. The free-for-all was won by Elmo, of Bangor, with Telephone, Ch'town, 2nd; and Black Pilot 3rd. Best time, 2.31.

Truro Exhibition.

TRURO, Sept. 27. Ten thousand people visited the Provincial Exhibition here to-day. The show of sheep, swine, horses and thoroughbred cattle was the finest ever made in Nova Scotia and is an evidence of the immense progress made during the past few years in Nova Scotia stock raising. There was also a superior display of fruits. But in all other respects the Exhibition was very unsatisfactory. There is a painful absence of manufactures and products of the mines and fisheries. There is only one exhibit of stoves and one of furniture, although Nova Scotia occupies the foremost place in these lines, while the manufactures of sugar, cotton, rope, woolen knitting, hats and caps, foundries, machine shops, boots and shoes, tanneries and other factories are entirely absent. This is a serious drawback to the Exhibition, and very much to the discredit of Nova Scotia manufacturers. The fruit show is not equal to that of other years, from the fact that the fruit has not matured, and the Exhibition is being held a week earlier, and the season being ten days later than usual.

There are no special features in connection with the Exhibition.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 27. There were 150 cases of yellow fever reported to-day and eight deaths. The general distress among the poor is daily increasing. Piteous appeals for relief daily come from the country districts to which refugees have fled.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 27.

The Board of Health this afternoon withdrew the non-intercourse regulations, and Memphis is now open to all excepting people from the infected districts. Hunger brought the quarantine officials of several other towns on the Mississippi to their senses.

Buckwheat Destroyed.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 27. Farmers arriving in town from all sections, to-day, report that last night's heavy rain-storm has destroyed large quantities of buckwheat, which was lying out in the fields drying. This, together with the damage wrought by the frost, will make the buckwheat crop the lightest known in these parts for years.

The African Rebellion.

SUAKIM, Sept. 27. Last evening the rebels under cover of darkness succeeded in entrenching themselves 500 yards to the right and in front of the water forts. A reconnaissance discloses that their position is strongly defended with guns, and the water forts are consequently in danger.

Determined to Strike.

LONDON, Sept. 27. At a conference of miners at Manchester, 250,000 miners were present. It was decided to strike on Oct. 29, unless the demands for an advance of 10 per cent. is acceded to. They also declare that they will not accept an advance unless it is general.

Man Killed.

SPRING HILL, N. S., Sept. 27. The lifeless body of John Ackles was found this morning in a ditch in Church street. The circumstances point very strongly to foul play, and it is expected that something startling will be elicited when the inquest is resumed.

Schooner Wrecked.

VICTORIA, Sept. 28. Schooner Carrier Dove, Green, master, from Sydney to Misou, coal laden, went ashore, the night of the 26th, on Tryon shoals. Total loss. Crew saved.
