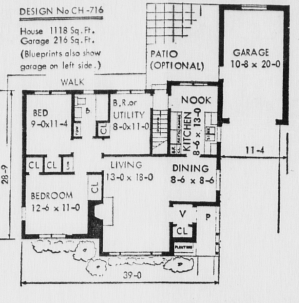
Latin Requirement For SDU Is Dropped

Because of the increasing difficulty in finding high school graduates with enough high school Latin for entry into the Arts course at St. Dunstan's University, the Latin requirement for entrance will be dropped next year. SDU president, Very Rev. G.A. MacDonald, announced recently.

In making the announcement Father MacDonald noted that practically all universities in Canada had dropped Latin as an entrance requirement. He said that some individual departments may still require Latin for completion of work in the field in which a student is majoring and Latin will still be taught as an elective.

In place of the two years of Latin required, two new courses will be added which, it is expected, will strengthen the arts course considerably.

Health Services To Be Provided

Referring to the closing of the one room nursing centre in Crapaud, Dr. Hubert MacNeill, Minister of Health said yesterday that "there will be no cut-back in services in the area".

Nurses from Summerside and Charlottetown will provide the services, and Dr. MacNeill said this will provide a better service as two or three nurses will be available from a larger centre.

School visits, well-baby clinics, vaccinations and inoculations are among the duties carried out at the clinic.

Farmer Educational Needs To Be Probed

A searching look will be taken here next Wednesday at the problem of agricultural educational needs in this province, when a conference sponsored by the P. I. Federation of Agriculture meets in morning and afternoon sessions at the Provincial Vocational Institute in Sherwood.

Participating in the day-long discussion will be men and women from many parts of the province along with several speakers from such places as Ottawa and Halifax.

Keynote speaker will be Rev. E. J. Roche, St. Dunstan's University.

The ministers of agriculture and education have endorsed the conference and both will be in attendance.

Dr. Alex. C. M. social scientist from Ottawa will discuss organizational responsibility. Jack Johnson, CBE, Halifax will discuss the role of radio and TV and Dr. W.A. Jenkins, who has received the appointment as principal of Nova Scotia Agricultural College — he takes over when the next term begins — will discuss the role the college can play.

PANEL DISCUSSIONS
Panel discussions will occupy a great deal of the time. One chaired by U. S. L. Loring, Sherbrooke will discuss the need of agricultural education for the farmer. Another discussing educational needs for the farm household will be chaired by Mrs. Douglas MacFarlane, guidance counsellor at the Summerside Vocational School.

An interesting discussion is expected from a panel of young people chaired by Garth Coffin, Prince of Wales College. They will talk about why farming has such a poor image among the youth of the province and give some views on what young island people are thinking.

The probe of agricultural educational facilities was suggested by the Federation of Agriculture at its annual meeting earlier this year. President Smith MacFarlane, Harrington will preside.

Federation spokesmen em-

phases their desire that as many people attend as possible. The invitation to the general public is most cordial and pressing.

Summing up at the end of the day's discussions will be Mrs. James Peter Gleason, West Royalty who has been active in Home and School, speaks five languages and has been service in many parts of the world with the diplomatic service; and Mr. Sim.

On a second charge of selling without first obtaining a license from the town and selling under the name of Ron Brown, the accused was fined \$40. The third charge of selling without a license under the name of Michael Long was withdrawn.

Safety Awards Made To Cities

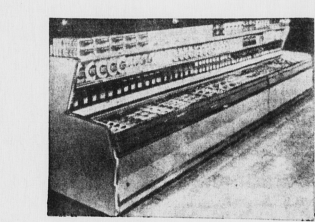
OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Highway Safety Council announced its annual awards to Canadian cities which completed 1963 with outstanding records of highway safety.

Awards to cities without a fatal accident last year included:

- Class "A" — cities with populations of more than 20,000: Quebec — Longueuil, Mount Royal, St-Jean.
- Class "B" — cities with populations of more than 10,000: Newfoundland — Bell Island, Nova Scotia — New Waterford.
- Class "C" — cities with populations of more than 5,000: Newfoundland — Gander, Grand Falls, Wabano, Windsor.
- Nova Scotia — North Sydney, Springhill, Stellarton, Yarmouth.
- New Brunswick — Bathurst, Dalhousie, Newcastle.
- Quebec — Bagotville, Beauharnois, Buckingham, Chateaugay, Coaticook, Farnham, Iberville, Laprairie, Lévis, LaSalle, Maric, Mont-Joli, Montmagny, Montserrat, Pointe-Gatineau, Port Alfred, Roberval, Roxboro, St-Eustache-sur-le-Lac, St-Felicien, St-Francois, Terrebonne.

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
