

Local and Other Items.

SCOTT ACT.—One offender was put down to jail this forenoon.

DELAYED.—The disagreeable weather has greatly retarded farming operations at South Lake.

TO LOAD POTATOES.—Mr. Joseph Macdonald, of South Lake, has chartered the schooner E. J. Hodgson to load potatoes for the American market.

SHIP NEWS.—Brigt. Peers, Outerbridge, master, due here from Bermuda to load, passed Low Point, steering for Sydney, on the 6th inst.

ROSEBANK FARM.—Rosebank Farm (123 acres) was sold to-day, realizing in the neighborhood of \$4000. Mr. Francis McKenna was the purchaser.

A MEAN THEFT.—A mean act of swindling was perpetrated at Ottawa a few nights ago. The corner stone laid by Lally Macdonald last summer, of the new Anglican Church, at Janerville, a suburb of Ottawa, was removed by crochards and the box containing the coins stolen.

THE FISHING SEASON OVER.—The Atlantic fishing season is about over, and from returns which have reached the fisheries department at Ottawa, it is quite evident that the catch will be away below that of last year, although the value will be about the same, owing to enhanced prices.

SEIZED THE OPPORTUNITY.—A New York couple were recently photographed while the marriage ceremony was being performed. The photographer probably thought that it would be much easier to get them to "look pleasant" at that moment than at any other period during their married lives.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Says the Woodstock Press: At Grafton, Sunday morning, while a child of Mr. John King, aged three years, was trying to make a fire in the stove, its clothing caught and before it could be reached and extinguished the garments were entirely destroyed and the child fearfully burned. It still survives with little hope of recovery.

GETS HIS PENSION.—Frank Welsh, of Portland, St. John, some nine years ago, applied to the United States government for a pension, he having served as a union soldier during the rebellion. He heard little regarding his claim up to Monday last, when he received a check for \$2,939 back pension, and the announcement that he would receive \$12 per month during his lifetime.

FIRE.—On Monday night last, a pigsty, woodhouse, and a large pile of firewood, belonging to Mr. Joseph McMillan, Clermont, were destroyed by fire, which is supposed to have originated from the furnace. Mr. McMillan's dwelling house was saved by the strenuous exertions of a crowd who gathered very quick, and who succeeded in subduing the fire. The loss is about \$200. No insurance.—Journal.

WIZARD OIL AGAIN.—The St. John Telegraph says:—On Tuesday, Dr. Ellis, of the Wizard Oil Company, was notified by the police that information had been laid against him under the Letters Act if he disposes of his prizes at the Institute as he has done in other places. Dr. Ellis at once wired his company for orders and received instructions to proceed as usual with his show and that his company would test the case. B., for Halifax on Friday at 8 o'clock. On the following day (Saturday) at 11 o'clock in the forenoon a heavy fog set in which continued until 2 o'clock p. m. The fog then lifted. It was then ascertained that the ship was going dead for Samba Head and in five minutes she would have dashed on the rocks. The engines were at once reversed and the vessel was put full steam astern.

HARRISON ELECTED

BEYOND A DOUBT.

Very Latest Figures.

Boston, Nov. 7. The latest returns indicate that the States have given the following pluralities for Harrison:—

The Democrats evidently have a small majority in the House of Representatives, while the next Senate is likely to be Republican by a majority of two, as at present.

Connecticut and New Jersey have gone Democratic by small majorities. All the other doubtful States are Republican, Indiana by a good majority. There is no truth in the Democratic sensational stories about, and Harrison is elected beyond the shadow of a doubt.

The Parnell Commission.

The Evidence Taken.

LONDON, Nov. 7. At a sitting of the Parnell Commission to-day the police witnesses gave testimony regarding the outrages in Ireland, which they believed due to the instigation of the League.

Several witnesses testified that the Land League have hunts were organized over lands belonging to persons who offended the League, for the pure purpose of damaging the crops.

The police testimony from Longhrea, Athenry and other places in Ireland showed that prior to the founding of league branches in those districts, the districts were comparatively free from crime, and that after the league meetings there was much turbulence, often culminating in outrages. It was testified that five murders quickly followed the founding of the Longhrea branch.

It is stated that Sir Charles Russell, Counsel for the Parnellites, will call a witness to swear that he forged the Times letters, and will show by enlarged photographs by a magic lantern, that in following the tracing beneath the signature the pen was repeatedly stopped in the course of writing.

The Admiral Dismissed.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 7. Admiral Possiet, has been dismissed from the Ministry of Railways, owing to the recent accidents to the Czars train.

Supreme Court.

THURSDAY, NOV. 8.

In the matter of the application of Clement Benoit for certiorari to remove conviction for a violation of the Canada Temperance Act, 1878, tried before the Stipendiary Magistrate.

This application was heard this morning, and the rule was made absolute. The point decided was that when a defendant is acquitted of an information charging him with selling liquor between two dates, no subsequent conviction can be made for an offence committed within the same dates. Hodgson, Q. C., for the application; W. S. Stewart contra.

An application of Catherine Joy for a certiorari was also heard. The point taken was almost similar to Benoit's, but there were other circumstances in connection with the dates. The Court reserved judgment. Hodgson, Q. C., for application; W. S. Stewart contra.

Telegraphic Odds and Ends.

A reservoir in Montreux, on the Lake of Geneva, used to work the electric railway, burst on Tuesday, destroying numerous houses and drowning many persons. Seven bodies have been recovered. To a deputation from Walsall, which waited upon him at Birmingham, Mr. Gladstone said he considered it his duty to remain in public life until the Irish question was definitely settled.

A private despatch received by the Roman Catholic ecclesiastical authorities at Montreal, from Rome, says that the opening of the Canadian College took place on Sunday in the presence of Archbishop Fabre, of Montreal, four Canadian bishops and a large number of Canadian clergy.

The Parnell Commission met again on Tuesday. Mr. Parnell was present. The first witness called was Ives, a New York Herald correspondent, who testified that he obtained an interview with Parnell which the Herald published on January 2, 1880. Several other witnesses gave testimony in relation to the outrages.

The Dublin Freeman's Journal asserts that all the dynamites in prison in the United Kingdom have been approached by emissaries of the Times, who informed them that the government would grant them liberty if they would give testimony for the Times before the Parnell commission. The prisoners refused to accept their freedom at such a price.

The final ballots in the Prussian election make the standing of parties as follows: 134 conservatives; 84 free conservatives; 98 centrists; 87 national liberals; 29 members of Freisinnige party; 13 Poles; 2 Danes; 2 Guelphs and 1 independent. Stocker, Richter, Rickert, Friedburg, Voss, Gneist and Virchow are elected.
