

The Railway Minister in Manitoba.

Sir Charles Tupper is in Manitoba. It is, we believe, his first visit to the Prairie Province, and he appears to be having a grand time of it. He is the guest of Lieut. Governor Cocheu when at Winnipeg, where a public banquet has been given him. Another has been given him at Portage La Prairie. He seems to be doing the Province industriously, and everywhere is welcomed with enthusiasm. Noting all this, one is struck with the wonderful change effected in this region in ten years. It was in the fall of 1870 that Capt. Cameron, Dr. Tupper's son-in-law, who accompanied the titular Lieutenant Governor MacDougall, had his passage into what is now called Manitoba barred by armed Half-breeds near Pembina, and Riel was dictator of the North West. Now, though Riel lives, he is as obsolete as the mastodon. Fort Garry with its few mean houses has become a splendid city with many thousands of inhabitants, the cart trail from Pembina to Red River has been superseded by a railway doing a large business, the country round about has been fast filling up with an energetic population, and is being dotted all over with schools and churches, and Riel's republic, or whatever it may be called, is a thoroughly loyal Dominion province rejoicing in the splendid future opening to its view. But great as have been the changes wrought in that far off region in the North West between this date and the fall of 1880 will be as great as the world over witnessed in the same space of time anywhere.

How to Keep Healthy.

Do not neglect ventilating your bedrooms when the weather becomes cold. In the morning hoist the windows, take off the bedclothes, shake and stir the ticks, turn the upper one over the foot-roll. This will prevent the impure odor penetrating further, and they will escape faster while the bed is warm, and you will not have to wait for the beds to air when you are ready to make them.

Have the room warm, bathe quickly, and wipe dry, and you will not feel chilly if it is done properly. One third of our lives is spent in our sleeping rooms. Do be particular about them. Let them be large, dry and pleasant.

The Canadian engineers employed to make a railway survey across Newfoundland are now in Montreal. They report having met with opposition from the inhabitants in certain sections, where the railway is regarded as the entering wedge of Confederation. The branch line from Spread Eagle Head to Harbor Grace, is 26 miles long. It runs along in the neighborhood of Spaniard's Bay, Bay Roberts, New Harbor, Dildo, and to two miles south of the telegraph road, passing Spread Eagle Peak on the east. A favorable location has been secured for the terminal station at Harbor Grace.

Indications of gold have been discovered at West River, Pictou. Petroleum has been discovered on the farm of James Fraser, Millbrook, Pictou. A local company associated with practical oil men has been formed, and prospecting will commence immediately.
