Debs Are At Ease Rehearsing

By SYLVIA HACK Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP)—A sophisticated, self-possessed group of Canadian debutantes is completing the final steps for their brief but nerve-racking curtsy before the Queen today. And most of them are taking it in their stride. The girls—some at European finishing schools, others just graduated, still others fresh off the boat from home—will be presented at Buckingham Palace and afterwards will join several hundred other guests at a garden party in the palace grounds. Many debutantes approach such an important moment with twirling nerves, but few of the 44 Canadian debutantes betray any butterflies. In a dress rehearsal Tuesday at the London home of the acting Canadian High Commissioner S. D. Pierce, the girls conducted themselves with grace and ease. Under the critical eyes of two ushers of the royal household, they filed into the drawing room, carefully adjusted their stances and then lowered themselves in the chief nightmare of the hesitant. There wasn't a suggestion of a wobble. POSSIBLE HEADACHE implicitly is the guide for garden party wear this year. Fitted clothes seem to be favored over the bouffant type popular on previous occasions. One possible headache is the weather. The heat wave is over and there have been frequent showers in the last few weeks. Most girls say they're too excited about the event to worry—although a few will carry umbrellas. Said freckle-faced Sidney Shakespeare: "Since I come from Vancouver, I'm used to unpredictable weather." Among the debutantes are Barbara and Carol Underhill, daughters of Stuart Underhill, an executive of Reuters news agency. The Underhills, formerly of Vancouver and Toronto, now live in Britain where Carol, nearly 19, works as a typist. Barbara, 17, is still at school. Governor-General Vincent Massey will be going to the garden party and will be in the royal enclosure. Massey is here on a two-month visit.

Crops Devastated By Hail In Saskatchewan

REGINA (CP)—A 200-mile trail of devastated crops, flattened farm buildings and battered summer cottages today stretches across Saskatchewan after a violent hail, wind and rain storm described as one of the worst in the province's history. Hailstones as large as hen's egg and 30-mile-an-hour winds Wednesday afternoon levelled wheat fields and gardens, uprooted trees and stripped them of their leaves and bark and disrupted power and communication lines. No serious injuries were reported but early estimates indicate damage will run into thousands of dollars with possibly hundreds of farms hauled out completely. Insurance adjusters said it may be days before the full extent of damage is known. Spawned in stifling 90-degree heat near Coderre, 40 miles southwest of Moose Jaw, the storm skirted Moose Jaw, an dthen ripped through a 15-mile-wide strip at more than 20-miles-an-hour northeast to the Canora district, 150 miles northeast of Regina. Much-needed rains followed the storm centre but arrived too late for thirsty crops, flattened by hail and wind. Hundreds of panes of glass were smashed. Four hours after the storm passed, hail was still piled eight inches high outside cottages.

Begins Postal Inspection Tour

MONTREAL (CP)—Postmaster-General Hamilton arrived in Montreal Wednesday, unobtrusively seated in a railway coach, to begin a coast-to-coast inspection of postal facilities. The new cabinet member, who retained his Montreal Notre-Dame-De-Grace seat for the Progressive Conservatives in the June 10 election, said he plans to take a few days off at a time to carry out his general inspection. When his train arrived 40 minutes late, baffled postal officials couldn't find the minister in the first class chair cars. They finally found him in one of the coaches. One of them began to chide him gently and was met with this response: "Why should I take a chair now when I've never travelled any other way but coach?" At a press conference Mr. Hamilton outlined reasons for his proposed visits to major postal centres. "This department has gone on without me for the last two weeks and I have an idea that I should learn much more before I start telling people what they should do. BIT AT A TIME. "I can't take a month or even a week at a time to look over the system, so what I'll have to do is take a look at it a bit at a time. I'll take a day or two off for this reason whenever I can. Mr. Hamilton praised departmental efficiency, implying there will be no earth-shaking changes in post office policies, certainly not in the immediate future. As an example, he cited the U.S. post office's \$450,000,000 loss last year compared with the Canadian department's \$6,500,000 profit. But profit really wasn't what the department wanted. "In general all we are after is a breakeven basis." Part of last year's surplus would be used this year in the overall salary increase. The remainder, he hoped, would be used to improve some segments of the post-

Chocolate Price Is In Dispute

NEW YORK (AP)—The nickel chocolate bar has become involved in an international tug-of-war. It's the centre of an impasse between Brazil, which produces cocoa, and the United States, which consumes a lot of it. But the outcome of the impasse is likely to be decided by the world's newest state—Ghana. At stake is the price, and possibly the quality, of such favorites as cocoa, candy bars, chocolate syrup and everything else using chocolate in one form or another. This is what's happening: The Bank of Brazil, which handles exports of that country's crop, has set a minimum export price of \$31.50 cents a pound in Brazil for cocoa beans. These are the beans from which chocolate is made. The price is equivalent to 34.25 cents at New York. Brazil is the world's second largest producer of cocoa. SAY IT'S TOO MUCH American chocolate manufacturers consider Brazil's price too

high. They say it's 10 cents higher than in April, before Brazil decided to attempt to peg the price. One question is whether there is enough cocoa around the world to satisfy demand without purchasing the Brazilian crop. A big impounderable in the situation is Ghana. This former British Gold Coast colony became independent March 6. It is the world's biggest cocoa producer. Its main crop harvest starts in October. Ghana currently is marketing cocoa at the world price. However, if that country should join Brazil in attempting to maintain prices, chocolate manufacturers would be in difficulties. Cocoa dealers think the stalemate will have to be resolved next month. By then, they say, the manufacturers will have to buy more aggressively to start building up for the autumn and Christmas markets.

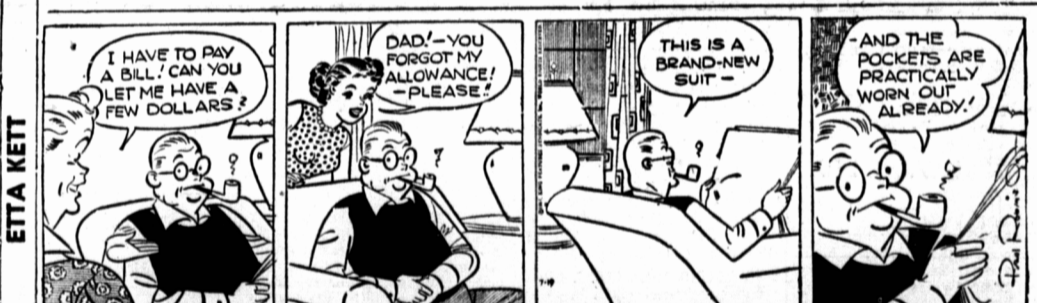
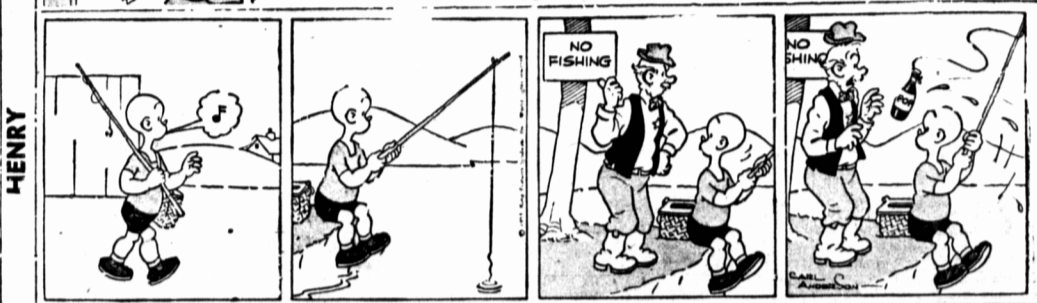

CONTRACT BRIDGE By B. JAV BECKER

QUEZ You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been: East South West North 1♣ Dbie. Pass 1♣ Pass ? What do you now bid with each of the following four hands? 1. ♠AQ72 ♣Q98 ♠4 ♠AKJ5 2. ♠J5 ♠AQ96 ♠AQ ♠KJ982 3. ♠AQ65 ♠AQ92 ♠4 ♠AQ97 4. ♠A86 ♠AQJ ♠9 ♠KQJ754 1. Two spades. The informatory double usually ranges from a hand that would just about qualify as an opening bid to one about ten points better. Once an informatory double has been made, the doubler is not required to bid again if all he has are the minimum requirements for the double, unless the responder makes a forcing bid to show game-going possibilities. When the doubler has values in excess of a minimum double, as in this case, he shows them by bidding again. The form his hand takes depends on both his distribution and the excess high card values. With the better than average spade support and about 3 high card points more than necessary for the double, he raises to two spades gives partner a good approximation of the doubler's strength. 2. One notrump. The choice lies between one notrump and two clubs. The notrump bid is preferred because it mirrors better both the high card strength and the balanced distribution. In this sequence, the notrump rebid represents a hand of opening one notrump proportions. A two club bid would tend to represent a more unbalanced hand and would not reflect the diamond strength and notrump possibilities. 3. Three spades. Here we have not only 18 high card points but also excellent distributional features as well as good trump support. To bid only two spades would be totally inadequate. Partner needs little more than five spades to the king to have a chance for game. To jump to four spades would also be incorrect. Partner has been forced to bid and may have a poor hand. The most that should be done is urge him to contract for game. The final decision should be his. 4. Two clubs. This is an underbid, but no better bid is available. Game is unlikely unless North voluntarily bids over two clubs. If he rebids his spades we should jump right to four, but as matters stand, only a temporizing bid of two clubs can be made. The point worthy of emphasis is that partner's spade bid promises nothing more than that he has four or more spades. Until he bids again, on his own power, it is best to treat as only
