Another provision is: "Unless the plaintiff shall prove either malice in fact, or that the defendant, after having been requested by him in writing to retract a libelous charge in as public a manner as that in which it was made, failed to do so within reasonable time, he shall recover only his actual damage proved and specially alleged in the declaration."

THE BELFAST RAILWAY.

Sir,—When interviewed by a Patriot representative Sir Louis H. Davies said that he would not ask his colleagues for a grant for the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway unless the Local Government would agree to give a yearly subsidy of \$12,000 for the Hillsborough Bridge. The electors of Belfast and Murray Harbor are very anxious to know what our local representatives intend to do in the matter.

Here is a good chance for Messrs. McDonald, Forbes and McKinnon to show their fidelity to their constituents.

When, on the eve of a general election, Mr. H. C. McDonald spoke so eloquently in favor of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway, on the floor of our Legislature, who could be so unjust as to doubt his sincerity.

When, about the same time, Mr. D. A. McKinnon was busily engaged in sending petitions to the Dominion Government asking for an immediate grant for this railway, who could be so unkind as to insinuate that it was only a "political dodge." However, the subsequent conduct of these men has been altogether inexplicable.

As soon as the Liberal party attained to power at Ottawa, these "local champions" seem to have lost all their zeal. No more resolutions were passed.

No more petitions were forwarded. Why is this? Have they no faith in the party, or have they lost all their interest in the matter?

Is it any wonder that many of the electors of both political parties should begin to look upon them with suspicion?

Sir Louis has now given them a grand opportunity to vindicate themselves before the people and show their influence with their party.

Hon. H. C. McDonald, one of the leaders of our Provincial Government, can surely induce his colleagues to grant the required subsidy.

Belfast and Murray Harbor have borne their share of the cost of constructing the P. E. I. R. We therefore feel confident that the representatives from the sections that have enjoyed Railway facilities for many years would be prompted by their sense of justice and fairplay to vote for this subsidy should the matter be properly presented to them.

The same sense of justice would, no doubt, induce the members of the House of Commons to grant the amount required for the construction of this railway should Sir Louis Davies fulfil his solemn promises to use his influence in the matter.

The electors have patiently waited eight long years for a fulfillment of those promises.

Mr. Martia has done much to strengthen his hand by proving conclusively, in the House of Commons that the Dominion Government never paid a cent for the construction of the P. E. I. R. although it was charged against the province in the Public Accounts year after year.

The correction of that error was certainly a most effective stroke in our favor.

It is truly surprising that such a glaring injustice to our province should, so long tolerated by our brilliant representatives. Let Sir L. H. Davies and Hon. H. C. McDonald "prove but true" at this juncture and long delayed justice will at last be meted out to the people of Belfast and Murray Harbor.
