

thereupon, a prosecution being instituted, and a decision obtained against them for said penalty: The House of Assembly, in consideration of the case, deem the provisions of said Acts unnecessarily severe, so far as regards Members of Assembly: And, therefore, pray that your Excellency will be pleased to forego the exaction of said Fines.

#### FISHERY BILL.

Bill for the Encouragement of the Cod and Mackerel Fisheries. The following is an Abstract of the Bill:

Be it enacted, That a Bounty of Twelve Shillings and Sixpence per Register ton for Old Measurement, shall be allowed on the Vessels hereinafter mentioned, being properly manned and equipped and embarked in the Cod and Mackerel Fisheries during either of the years 1851, 1852, and 1853: the said Bounty to be payable to the Person or Persons being an Inhabitant or Inhabitants of this Island. Provided that such Vessels shall respectively be equipped and fully furnished with all needful supplies, stores, and materials. The second Clause enacts, That the Bounty shall extend to all Vessels expressly fitted out for the purpose of the Cod and Mackerel Fisheries, and which shall have been in the actual prosecution of the Fishing Voyage for a period of not less than three and a half Calendar months, between the 15th June and the 1st October in either of the said years, (unless and excepting such time as may be required to return to land fish caught or taken by the crew thereof.) The third Clause provides for the appointment for each Harbour in the Island of two or more Commissioners for settling claims for Bounties under this Act. It also provides that every such Vessel, at the time of commencing a Fishing Voyage, shall have on board, for the prosecution of the said Voyage, at least one month's stores and provisions, and that the Crew shall consist of at least one man for every five tons, up to twenty tons, and one man for every six tons above twenty tons, and up to forty-two tons, and one for every eight tons over forty-two tons. The third Clause enacts, That for the further encouragement of the Mackerel Fishery, there shall be granted, over and above any Tonnage Bounty, the sum of One hundred Pounds, which, in each of the same years, shall be paid and applied as Bounties to the owners of such Four Vessels or Boats as shall catch and bring in to Port in this Island the greatest number of Barrels of Mackerel, caught and secured by the Crew or other persons on board of such Vessels or Boats, during the Fishing Season in any one of the above years, and to be paid in the following proportions, that is to say to the Owner of the Vessel or Boat having the largest quantity of Barrels of Mackerel, the sum of Forty Pounds; to the owner of the Vessel or Boat having the next largest quantity, the sum of Thirty Pounds; to the owner of the Vessel or Boat having the next largest quantity, Twenty Pounds; and to the owner of the next or fourth Vessel or Boat having the next largest quantity, the sum of Ten Pounds: Provided that no Bounty shall be given to the owner of any such Vessel or Boat not having caught or brought into Port at least One hundred Barrels of Mackerel during the Fishing season, on which such Bounty shall be claimed.
