

Quarter Finals Set For Today

MONTREAL (CP)— Bobby Cole, the 18-year-old South African, forgot to concentrate down the back nine Thursday and nearly blew his third-round match in the Canadian amateur golf championship to Dick Sucher of Mequon, Wis.

The young British Amateur champion had a three-hole lead over the unheralded Sucher through the 15th, then lost the 16th and 17th and hung on to halve the 18th with a shaky putt and win one up.

The field tolled through two rain-soaked rounds Thursday and had come down to the quarter-finals with the three pre-tournament favorites still in there.

Bunky—Henry of Valdosta, Ga., defending champion, was all even with Keith Alexander of Calgary going into the last nine and threw a pair of birdies at Alexander that virtually snuffed out the Calgarian's chances. Henry won 3 and 2.

Nick Weslock of Burlington, Ont., three-time Canadian Amateur champion won 5 and 3 over Ray Briddon of Toronto in the morning and 5 and 4 over Montreal's Gordon LeRiche in the afternoon.

Ed Shack Ordered To Minors

TORONTO (CP)— Eddu Shack, one of last season's high scorers for Toronto Maple Leafs, said Thursday he has been ordered to report to Victoria Maple Leafs of the Western League by Sept. 25.

The colorful Shack, who had 26 goals and 17 assists in the 1965-66 season for his biggest year, said he was given no reason for his apparent demotion to the Leafs' coast farm team.

He said he was "shocked" but indicated he wouldn't fight the order, which he received in a letter from manager coach Punch Imlach.

"I probably wouldn't do much good anyway," he said. "He's the boss and if this is his thinking, what can I do. If I have to go down, I'm glad it's Victoria."

Imlach was not available, but it was recalled that at the start of last season he shipped Shack down to Rochester of the American Hockey League, and the afternoon with highly regarded Dick Siderow of Westport, Conn., at the 19th hole, the only time he was in front in the match.

It could have been the feelings of Emmet Bernard were sadly hurt for he promptly went out and teamed his horse to a blazing 2:05.4 mile, the fastest to be seen on the island this season. The Craig, R. Dawson gelding showed plenty of gumption in coming back in the sixth and fighting off a stretch challenge by Rose Robin to win the second half of the double in a time of 2:06.3.

In comparison the free-for-all class saw Jim Fashion and Eloise Wick split honors in times of 2:07.4 and 2:08 but Eloise Wick won top honors with a better summary of 2:1 compared to 1:3 by Jim Fashion. The fine trotter, Little Art who broke the first time out came right back to take place money in the second heat.

The third attraction of the evening was the early closer for Maritimebred three-year-olds and here again there was a real battle but in slower times. Speedy Conn (1-1) and Mr. Jollity (1-2) were the winners in the two heats but Speedy Conn got the nod on the basis of the 2:11.4 mile the second time out. Mr. Jollity went in 2:13.

The quinnella feature on the third dash provided the best pay of the evening as longshot on the board at 15-1, Willard's Choice, led Lee Allen to the wire. The pay was good for 73.00 on the quinnella. However Whirl a Wick, who got boxed the first time out came back in the seventh dash and won in a thrilling finish over Lee Allen again.

This trot has been a thriller each time these horses have met—Captain Chie leaving on the rail with Peters Model in second position will mean a very fast quarter in this event. Stalag Hanover in third, Irene Mir in fourth, Lucky V in fifth and the trotter Fisherman's Luck in sixth position. This should make for a fast quarter and the traffic should be heavy up the backstretch the first time around with Jollitop and Security Scott leaving in the trailing positions. The preferred race will have Timmie H on the rail with Texas D leaving in second spot and Countess Alice leaving three. Mr. MacElwyn Key should be very tough in fourth with the Stanley Maynew owned Meadow Day in fifth with White Lady going out of there in the position.

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Canadians Keep Winning At British Empire Games

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Canada ran its gold medal production to nine at the British Empire Games Thursday when husky Dave Steen of Toronto won the men's shot-put championship and the Canadian men's swimming team got a gift gold award in the 440-yard medley relay after Australia was disqualified.

Steen is a 24-year-old sports editor for a Toronto suburban weekly. He tossed the shot 61 feet, eight inches for a Games record. Les Mills of New Zealand, the men's discus gold medalist, was second for the silver.

George Puce of Toronto took the third-place bronze, his second medal in the track and field competition. Puce, a first-year student at the University of Nevada, was the silver medalist in the discus.

Harry Jerome of Vancouver failed in his bid for a men's sprint double when he finished seventh but Australia's Diane Burge accomplished just that in the women's dashes.

Jerome, who won the 100-yard dash gold medal last Saturday, couldn't catch the speedy fly in the 200, and trailed in 21.4 seconds. The 25-year-old Canadian sprinter had hoped to become the first Canadian to win the double in Games history.

Big Sam Allotey of Ghana took the gold award with a time of 20.7. Edwin Roberts of Trinidad collected the silver and David Ejoke of Nigeria the bronze. Roberts' time was 20.9. Don Domansky of Port Arthur, Ont., was fifth in 21 seconds flat.

GETS SECOND GOLD
 Irene Piotrowski, the Vancouver housewife who collected a silver for second place behind Mrs. Burge, in the short sprint, was third in the 2:30 as the Aussie speedster got her second gold of the Games.

Mrs. Burge's time was 23.8.

Island Golfers In Last Place

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)— Gayle Hitchens of the Capilano Golf Club in North Vancouver burned up the 5,700-yard Brightwood course with a two-under-par 70 Thursday to take the first-round lead in the 54-hole Canadian women's close golf championships.

Miss Hitchens, who said she was "hitting the ball" where I wanted to, carded a 35 on the par 37 front nine and scored a par 35 coming home. She was three strokes up on Marilyn Palmer of Kamloops, B.C., who had a 73.

Junior Marilyn Karch was tied with Barbara Renwick of Vancouver for third place in the close competition, both with 78s. Mary Fenton of Halifax, Gail Moore of Scarborough, Ont. and Mrs. Ted Homenuik of Winnipeg each scored 76 on the first 18 holes of medal play.

The combination of Miss Hitchens and Miss Palmer led British Columbia into a comfortable 22-stroke lead over Saskatchewan in the 36-hole inter-provincial team match. Their scores and the combined 157 total of teammates Miss Renwick and Janet MacWha gave the West-Coast province a 300 aggregate.

Miss Karch was two strokes ahead of Bonnie Legge of Thornhill, Ont. in the 54-hole race for the junior title.

the same as countrywoman Jennifer Lamy, who won the silver. Mrs. Piotrowski was caught in 23.9.

The swimming disqualification took place in the men's 440-yard medley relay final. Two Australians, Graham Dunn and Bob Wenden, were off too quickly in the last two legs—butterfly and freestyle—and the two Australian judges disqualified them.

STARTED TOO SOON
 The judges called Dunn and Wenden for starting their legs before their predecessors touched.

Canada, a well-beaten second at the finish, instead was placed first for the gift gold, the eighth gold medal for the Canadian team in the Games. England won the silver and New Zealand captured the bronze.

The disqualification was embarrassing enough for the Australians but rubbing salt in their wounds was the fact they were deprived of a world record.

They were timed unofficially in four minutes, 3.5 seconds, well under the standing mark of 4:05.4 set by an East German team in Leipzig last year.

Canada's time of 4:10.5 was a full seven seconds slower but it went into the record books as the winning time and also as a Games record.

The Australians, however, were not to be denied in the men's 440-yard freestyle relay final about an hour later. They beat their Canadian rivals easily to win the gold with a world record clocking of 3:33.5, wiping out the 3:38.1 mark also set by East Germany in Leipzig a year ago.

Canada gained the second-place silver medal in 3:42.3 and England took the third-place bronze in 3:43.7.

WINS FOURTH SILVER
 Ralph Hutton of Ocean Falls, B.C., swimming No. 2 in the lineup, thus gained his fourth silver medal of the Games. He also has one bronze and shared the gold for the medley relay.

In the medley, Hutton, Leonard Chase of Montreal, Ron Jacks of Vancouver and Sandy Gilchrist of Ocean Falls broke the former Games mark of 4:14.2 set by Australia in Perth four years ago.

England's second-place clocking of 4:11.2 also was under the Games record and New Zealand had a time of 4:17.5 for third place.

Backstroke Peter Reynolds and breaststroke Ian O'Brien, both Games champions and world record-holders in their specialties as was Wenden, had given the Aussies a wide lead at the halfway mark.

Dunn broke too soon swimming the third or butterfly leg, and anchor freestyler Wenden did the same thing.

"The good Lord must be looking after us," said Canadian swimming coach Ted Simpson of Vancouver. "But we'll take it to make up for that gold medal we lost in women's diving."

Beverly Boys of Pickering, Ont. had been leading after three of the seven dives in the competition was halted because of unfavorable winds following English and Australian protests, a restart was ordered and the 15-year-old Canadian girl finished third.

Diana Harris of England took the women's 110-yard breaststroke title with Jill Slattery, another English girl, second and Heather Saville of Australia third. Miss Harris equalled the Games record of 1:19.7. Donna Ross of Montreal, the only Canadian to reach the final, placed seventh in 1:23.0.

The 220-yard butterfly title was captured by New Zealand's David Gerrard in 2:12.7. Brett Hill of Australia was second and Arusoo followed him in 2:14.2. Jacks took the fourth spot and Gordon Eby of Prince Rupert, B.C., was eighth and last.

The Canadian medal total for swimming and diving had reached an amazing 18—five golds, eight silvers and five bronzes.

Canada's fourth shooting medal of the Games was won by Dr. Jules Sobrian, medical health officer from Omemee, Ont. third in the 22-calibre pistol silhouette event.

In the women's diving, the outcome was a heartbreaker for Miss Boys, who had her heart set on a gold after she took the lead on Monday's opening compulsory dives.
