Sir Charles Dilke's Case

For several years Sir Charles Dilke has been a very prominent figure in English politics. He was a leading member of the late Liberal cabinet, and in point of ability was generally regarded as second only to Mr. Gladstone himself.

We think it was in the month of August last that the scandal in which the names of Sir Charles Dilke and Mrs. Crawford—a married lady—also moving in the highest social circles in England were connected, was first published to the world.

At the time the scandal came to light, Sir Charles was a widower, and engaged to be married to Mrs. Pattison—a lady of marked literary culture—and widow of Rev. Dr. Mark Pattison, a learned Professor and eminent Divine of the English Church.

While this case was pending, Mr. Gladstone's present Cabinet was formed, and it was well understood that if Sir Charles' innocence was established a high position was to be reserved for him.

—A most contemptible insinuation against the respected High Sheriff of this County, Henry Longworth, Esq., appears in yesterday's Patriot over the signature of "Hemp."
