should receive a small dose of phenothiazine or a drench of bluestone and nicotine. Repeat in one month if necessary. 3. Symptoms of diarrhoea in the autumn months are advance signs of future unthriftiness. Affected animals should be treated with phenothiazine, and if the grass is dry and sparse, supplementary feed should be provided.

Phenothiazine Tablets

The following procedure should be followed carefully when giving this treatment.

Winter or Spring Treatment: 1. Treat all adult animals, including the ram. 2. The number of tablets to be given depends upon the weight of the sheep, as follows: (a) Up to 100 lbs., 3 compound tablets (12 1/2 grams each).

Summer and Autumn Treatments: 4. Flocks subject to diarrhoea or scouring in the autumn should be treated in September or at the first sign of diarrhoea in young animals.

Baby Chicks

Starting in the month of December and for five or six months thereafter people will be buying day old chicks of various breeds and from many different hatcheries.

Before deciding where the chicks will be purchased from, serious consideration should be given to several factors. One of the most important things is to make sure that the chicks are coming from disease free stock, and a disease free area. All chicks coming from Government Inspected Hatcheries have been hatched from pullorum free stock.

However, some of these areas where the respiratory diseases are more prevalent are practicing vaccination by one method or another. This may not be the type of birds most desired here in this Province.

Before the chicks arrive, all necessary arrangements should be made for properly housing them. Make sure that there is proper heat and ventilation, and that the baby chicks are not housed with older birds.

One or a combination of the following causes heavy mortality in baby chicks each year, that is over crowding, chilling or over heating. It doesn't take very much of any one of these to cause a high mortality in chicks.

TAKE BABY TO THE MOVIES

There was the ring of steel on steel; pistol shots; the rattle of machine guns; the sound of human beings in agony, gasping, screaming; bodies plunging to death; blood—and row on row of small children yelling with delight at this moving-picture presentation of slaughter in technical color.

Of course those who died, were mostly villains, but in the first part of the film many gallant men had been ambushed, and all but the hero had been slain. The second part showed the vengeance meted out by the hero, and his far smaller number of followers, on the evil doers.

Perhaps this picture did no harm to the stronger youngsters of ten and over; who attended the theatre the other afternoon. A few months ago, in dealing with the subject of comics, radio, and the movies, I explained that many psychologists believe the presentation of violence is not always bad. It may have value for those who can take it. Small people in a grown-up world do get pushed around considerably and cannot always show their feelings.

In scenes like the above, where the hero triumphs, children can identify themselves with him and tions of anger, jealousy, hate and resentment. But many a child sitting near me, did not seem either old enough or robust enough to benefit by such fare. Some were barely able to toddle; a large number were under ten. A delicate little girl of about six, next to me, looked stricken. She was very pale; her eyes were staring.

I, myself, am not geared to violence. There was one horrible scene of torture where I kept my eyes away from the screen, my fingers in my ears to shut out the victim's cries of agony. But I noticed the children around me were not missing a thing!

Who can foretell the world of the future? We can hope for good results from the Big Three Conference now being held, and the Big Four on the agenda. And still others to come. Then again, it is possible that our children will have to be hardened. But surely children of three, four, five and six, are too young!

I believe many parents have failed to look very carefully into the moving picture situation as it affects their small children. Certainly mothers need an afternoon now and then, free of the demands of the young child. At the moving picture house they think he is safe. It is an understandable temptation to send him there, regardless of the program.

An amusing instance of this happened one afternoon when a friend and I went for a drive, taking her three children with us. At the door of the moving picture house, she dropped them off.
