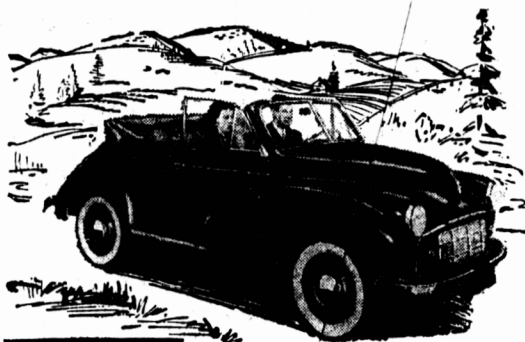

**Fine Turnout On Inspection By S.D.U. Cadets**

Saint Dunstan's College Cadet Corps, No. 84, presented a neat, snappy appearance when they paraded before Brigadier G. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., at their annual inspection held on the University athletic field yesterday afternoon.

Other members of the inspecting party were Major Lloyd E. Weliner, 2nd in-command of the 28th L.A.A. Regiment, Captain George Holliswell, chief cadet training officer of Nova Scotia-Prince Edward Island, and Father F. L. Cass, chief instructor of the Saint Dunstan's College Cadet Corps.

Following the inspection, Brigadier Peake complimented the corps on their fine turn out, steadiness on parade and gave a brief talk on the importance of cadet training which is so essential at the present time when United Nations forces are fighting in Korea and the world in general is faced with strife and turmoil.

The corps, which is affiliated with the 28th L.A.A. Regiment was made up of two platoons, commanded by 58 all ranks. Officers on the corps staff were: Captain Tom McLaughlin, 2nd in command, lieutenants Maurice Flynn and Earl Power, C.Q.M.S. Aloysius McIsaac and Sergeants David MacCormac and Damien Leonard were the platoon N. C. O.'s.

The drum and bugle band in attendance was composed of Bandmaster Warren MacRae, Kenny MacDonald, Ken Grant, Roy Grant, Cyril Callaghan, Merritt Crockett, Raymond Allard, Jock Gilbert.

Instructors responsible for the corps training were chief instructor or Father F. L. Cass, John Mulhally, Jim Saunders and A. J. McAdam.

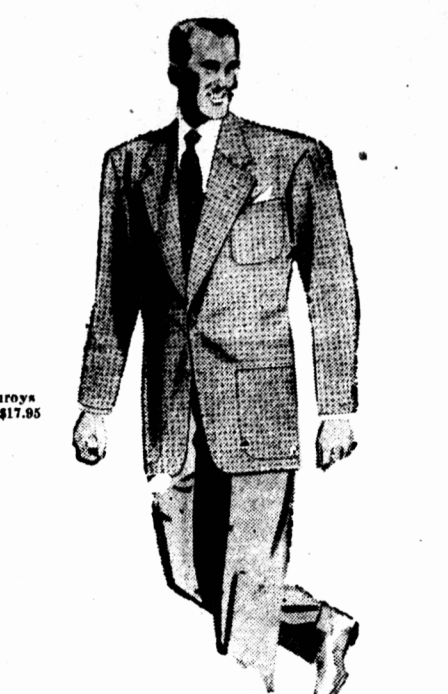

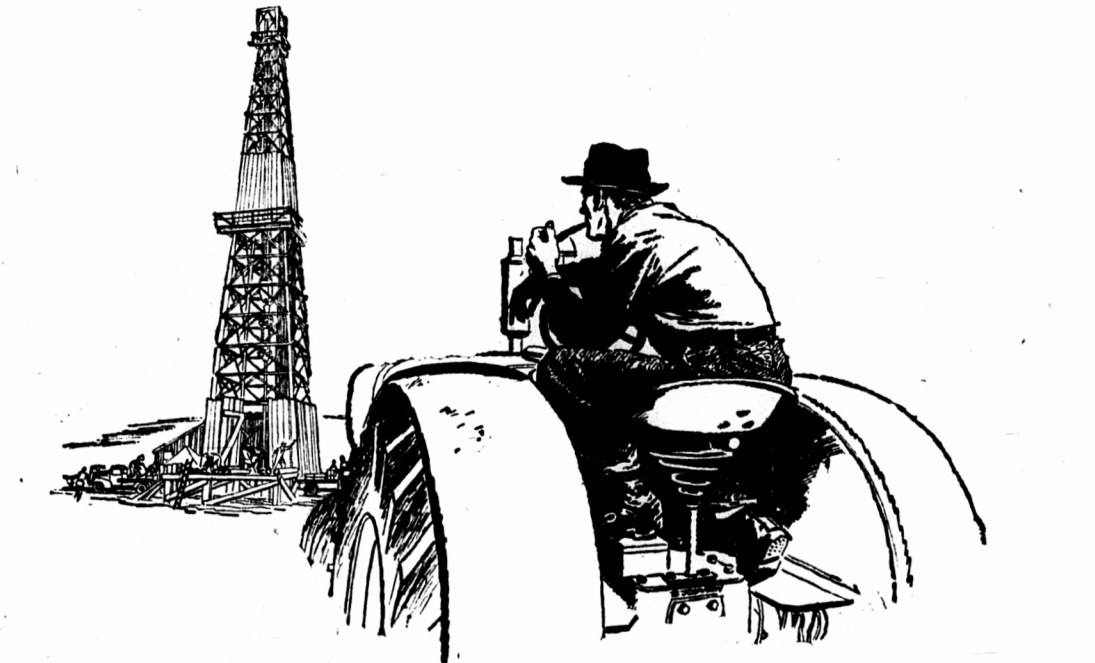

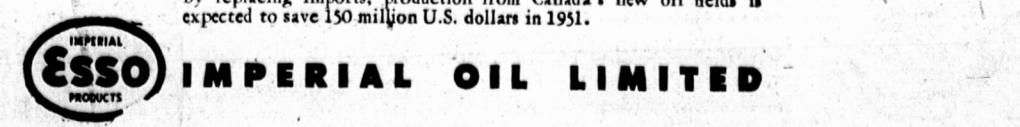
