Ownership Of Color TV Sets Is Expected To Zoom Upward

MONTREAL (CP)—The number of color television sets owned by Canadians is expected to increase by about 550 per cent in the next few years.
Propelling this growth will be the introduction of Canadian-originated colorcasting next Oct. 1, an event which has pre-occupied outlets, advertising agencies and manufacturers in recent years.
At a seminar on colorcasting here recently, the J. Walter Thompson Co. Ltd., an advertising agency, released some eye-brow-raising figures to the more than 100 television, business and industrial executives attending it.
Ten years ago when color transmissions were being introduced in the United States there were 10,000 colored television sets. Today there are 5,000,000 or one for every 10 households.
20,000 GET COLOR NOW
Compared with this, there are 20,000 sets able to receive color in Canada today. By the end of the year this figure is expected to rise to 70,000, and to 190,000 in 1967. The Thompson company said that by the end of 1970 there should be 1,100,000 sets in Canadian homes.
The Board of Broadcast Governors has already approved applications from the CBC, CTV and 11 private stations which will start "unofficial" colorcasting on Oct. 1 when the new television season traditionally begins. Officially, the BBG has set Jan. 1, 1967, as the starting date.
Interest to the layman in color television is probably the price field. Sets which were available two years ago in the U.S. for \$1,000 now are going for \$195, with some as low as \$250, the seminar was told.
Canadian prices go as high as \$1,295 and as low as \$720.
In the U.S., the National Broadcasting Company's night time schedule is 95-per-cent color. The American Broadcasting Company, 32; and the Columbia Broadcasting System, 28.
R. D. Senior, president of the Canadian subsidiary of J. Walter Thompson agency, said at the seminar 50 per cent of Canada's population is aged 25 and under. "As communicators," he said, "they present a special challenge."
