Carpenters Hold Meeting At Summerside

The regular monthly meeting of local 2288, Carpenters and Joiners of America, was held in the Town Hall Summerside last evening, and was open to the public for the discussion of labor problems.

A progress report from the committee on collective bargaining was heard; this committee is composed of members chosen from the local union executive for the purpose of bargaining with the local employers.

The meeting was presided over by the president, Mr. G. Allison Horne.

Mr. Arthur E. Holland, of Summerside, president of local 1811, United Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, addressed the meeting of matters relating to and affecting the electrical workers in regard to present and past legislation as it affected the Trade Union Act.

Referring to the present labor dispute between his union and the Island Telephone Company, he stated that the present act did not prevent the workers from striking if a satisfactory settlement could not be reached with the Public Utilities Commission.

He added that he hoped such an agreement would be reached, and he hoped that all trade unions in the Province would regard this as a mutual support for the right of the employee.

Mr. Holland also reported on the organization of a union council as a means of strengthening unions in general throughout the Island.

Its value, chiefly sentimental, may be as much as \$10, antique experts in London said.

Creating Light Through Recreation

"An important element in the rehabilitation programme of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind," said Mrs. S. T. Green, member of the P. E. I. Advisory Board to the C. N. I. B. and Special Names Chairman for Charlottetown in the Institute current campaign for funds, "is the special adaptation of games and appliances for the use of sightless men and women. For example, picture to yourself two blind men who are playing cards using at what appears at a glance to be ordinary playing cards, but these cards have in addition to the ordinary printed markings, small Braille dots and by touching these dots the player is able to read the number and suit of each card. Since the cards are marked both in Braille and print, the blind men can enjoy the game with another sighted person or with sighted friends. Checker boards and chess games are also specially adapted, with square hollows on the wooden board taking the place of the black squares, and the checkers are made in two sizes so that the blind player can tell his men by size rather than color. Even the game of bingo has been made available to the blind by metal cards instead of ink print paper cards. The metal cards have a hollow circle for each number and the number is written in the hollow by means of raised Braille dots, so that when a called number is found on the card it can be covered by a small metal washer instead of small objects used by sighted bingo players. Interlocking dominoes with Braille markings, and other popular games have also been made available through the C. I. N. B.

Besides the adaption of recreational games which are so important in helping the adult blind to pass what would otherwise be long and tedious hours, the C. N. I. B. makes available Braille pocket and wrist watches, alarm clocks, self-threading needles, white canes, and many other appliances which help in the practical day to day living of the blind housewife, the sightless canteen operator and blind Canadians generally. These appliances like the playing cards and games, are available to the blind at cost or less.

Concurrent with Canadian National Institute for the Blind's constant striving to improve its employment service, Home Teaching, Braille and Talking Book Library service, and social services, the continuous search for a better and wider range of specially adapted games and appliances goes on. Only with continued public financial support can the work of improved recreation, rehabilitation, and education continue to be their light in the darkness which will make life more livable for those who have lost their sight.
