Sherwood Scout Troop Has its Blood Typed

The First Sherwood Scout Troop last night established a first in Prince Edward Island, and which also may be a first in Canada, when some 40 scouts underwent blood typing by technicians from the provincial department of health.

The idea originated with the assistant scoutmaster, William Stafford, who stated that several months ago he foresaw the value in having children's blood typed.

In the case of the scouts, Mr. Stafford said, "such information will be of great benefit to scout authorities, when the boys become summer camps". The scouts will be required to carry their blood type card with them at all times, so that it will be readily available should they become involved in a serious accident.

Mr. Stafford said that the first approach the Provincial Boy Scout Council had to undertake it as a council project, but that it should be set up as a troop project, providing it received the full backing of the parents of the scouts.

This was obtained, and it was then taken up with the provincial health department, who informed Mr. Stafford that it should be taken up with higher authority. So he then became engaged in lengthy correspondence with the federal health department.

Mr. Stafford said "after considerable exchange of correspondence Ottawa finally became convinced of the merits of such a project, and gave the final approval."

Armed with this approval, he then completed arrangements with the provincial department to stage a clinic at Sherwood Hall, and laboratory technicians, Sandra White and John LaBrecht, were assigned to taking the blood samples, which will be typed in the provincial laboratories.

At that time words were blowing from the west-north-west at a gentle eight m.p.h. These were expected to increase to the west and increase to 15 m.p.h. Generally the weather throughout today is expected to remain clear and cold.

New Flying Club Has line Enrolled

The thrill of flying a small aircraft has already brought nine enrollees to the newly formed Charlottetown branch of the Maritime Central government approved club which formed last Friday and operates out of the Maritime Central Airways hangar, next to the Enlist hangar.

The members, consisting of Peter Tanton, Wallace Rodd, Robert Beer, Donald Eves, John Morley, John O'Connor, Bruce Judson, Ralph MacArthur, and one female member, Bernadette Brazil, will be receiving instruction on a course which will qualify them for a commercial or private pilot license meeting air-line standards when the course is completed.

Three planes fully equipped for aerobatics and stunts have been leased from the Motion picture club. One is an ex-Air Force Fairchild Cornell and the two others are smaller types.

Irving Murphy, the head instructor is assisted by Peter Glennie of Oxford, Nova Scotia. Both pilots are highly qualified with considerable experience in this job working at the Motion Club which in the last four years has won the S.A.F. Flying Award presented by the Royal Canadian Air Force to the club who go through the year without an accident.

Members may join the club providing that he is pronounced physically fit by a department of transport doctor. The government will pay back 10 per cent of the cost of the course if the person is under 32 and finishes the course within one year.
