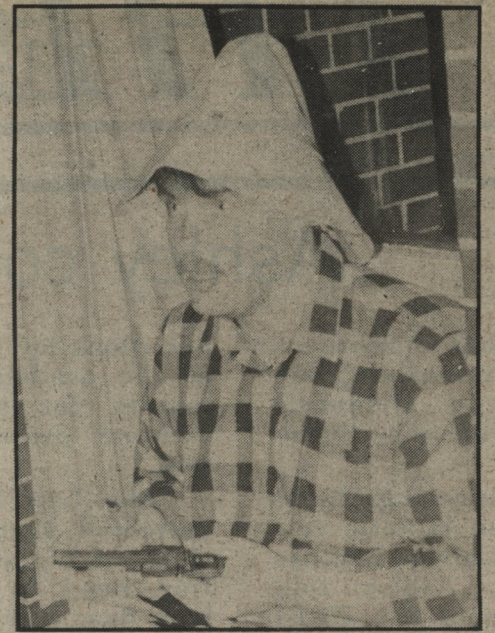

Groups say Carling O'Keefe ban not over

Vancouver (CUP) - Student council at the University of British Columbia are another council considering restocking Carling O'Keefe products.

UBC Student council voted overwhelmingly March 4 to remove Carling's name from signs it erected a year ago in its student centre advising students of that company's South African links. But some apartheid groups say their boycott of the company is not over yet.

Council decided to erase Carling's name from the signs after the Toronto-based Rothmans Inc. sold its 50.1 per cent interest in the brewer to the Australian conglomerate, Elders IXL.

But Vancouver lawyer Zayed Gamiet, who is also a member of the Anti-apartheid Network Committee, said the organization will not call off its official boycott of Carling until it confirms that Elders is free of any South African links.

He said a report in MacLean's magazine dated March 9 suggested Elders could have South African interests.

"We're looking into the company (Elders). So far we haven't found any South African con-

nections, but it's possible that it may," he said.

UBC's campus anti-apartheid group, Students for a free Southern Africa, has also said it will not stop its ban of Carling products until it is convinced Elders has no South African interests.

"We want more information on the company before we end our boycott," said Mary McAlister, a member of SFSA.

At the March 4 meeting, some council members wanted the motion to remove the Carling name from the

apartheid warning signs tabled until Statistics Canada confirmed Carling's sale to a non-South African interest, but the motion was defeated, said Don Isaak, AMS director of finance.

Asked why council voted to go ahead with the motion, Isaak said the decision was based on common knowledge of Carling's sale reported by major newspapers.

The University of Victoria's student council decided to end its own 16-month long boycott of Carling products on March 2

For the tiebreaker, 3 notes were hidden in 3 different books in the library. Each team was given the subject, title and author of the books and the first team to return with 2 out of the three notes were declared winners.

Congratulations to Jennifer's team for making it back in record time and picking up the \$75 in prize money!
