round which the village is built, some enclosures formed by palisades, and marked by small wooden crosses. In response to my enquiries, I was told that these were the graves of sailors whose bodies had been cast ashore during some of the storms which so often occur here. Nothing more sad can be imagined than the lonely graves of these unknown men, within hearing of the cruel sea which first took their lives and then cast their bodies upon the rocks. The poor fishermen who found them gave of their time to dig their graves (no easy work on that rocky mountain), and with simple faith placed over them, as though to guard the lonely spot, a little cross, which the Greeks so beautifully call "the silent intercessor"; and, their wanderings forever over, there they lie, few knowing of their last resting place—who they were none know. It may be that in some village in sunny France, where the grapes grow upon the hillside, and the girls with naked feet tread the rich juice from the grapes, some mother hopes that her son may even yet return, to lighten the load which so heavily presses upon the aged. But the cruel sea and the rocky mountain keep their secret, and she hopes in vain. God grant strength to her, and to the sleepers rest and peace.

From this village with its sad associations, we drove to where the codfish is set out to dry preparatory to being shipped to France. Acres of ground have been levelled and are covered thickly with large stones, washed clean and white by the rain, and on these the fish are spread in the sun to dry. The scene resembled nothing so much as a huge hay-field, with hay in cock. Here some men were gathering up the fish and carrying them to others who stacked them into small piles just like hay-cocks. Others were turning the fish so that they might thoroughly dry. From this field we drove home. Our strange equipage excited no wonder among the people. Nothing impressed me more than the thorough courtesy of the Frenchmen, fishermen and laborers. As we passed them every hat was doffed as though we had been visitors of importance, when it was only their own innate politeness.

When I go away from this quaint little place I shall carry with me the knowledge of much that was strange to me before; yet I think that amid the barren and forlorn appearance of the Island, the peculiarities of its inhabitants, the heartfelt longing which seems to possess one and all of them to be able some day to visit their beloved la belle France,—that which impressed me most and which I shall remember longest will be the recollection of the lonely graves of the unknown sailors whose bodies rest so quietly beneath the little crosses on the side of the mountain that overlooks the quaint little town of St. Pierre.
