**Egyptian War Notes.**  
**THE ARMED LOCOMOTIVE.**  
A skirmish of a somewhat novel kind is reported from Alexandria. It is said that Arabi Pasha sent a railway train to the Aboukir junction, and that an armed locomotive and tender being sent to meet it several shots were exchanged between the hostile trains. The use of railway cars for military purposes, however, is not wholly unprecedented. When Paris was held by the Communists of 1871, against the Versailles troops under Marshal McMahon, the latter sent "cruised trains" along one side of the city, which opened fire upon the enemy's works with considerable effect. Shortly after the railway through Calabria was completed the Italian Government wishing to punish the brigands who persistently endeavoured to wreck or plunder the passing trains, spread a report that on a certain day a vast quantity of gold would be sent along the line. On the day indicated a locomotive was seen approaching with a freight van of enormous size, ostensibly filled with specie, but really containing a number of carbiners, who made short work of the inquisitive banditti. Such facts are a curious commentary upon the verdict of a cynical old naval officer on the invention of ironclads:—"Now that they've done that, they may just as well fight with ironclad trains, too, and destroy honest warfare altogether."

**SOME NARROW ESCAPES.**  
The Daily News correspondent writes of a highly respectable family "whose experience and sufferings exceed those of any other case I have yet heard of, consisting of father, mother, and eighth child, mostly of tender age. They were left in charge of a valuable house of a wealthy relation. After the bombardment the house was attacked and robbed, and many of the houses near being on fire, the family removed to another house at Cameldik, in the outskirts of the town, where they thought to be safe from the mob and the fire. In this they were right, as everyone had fled from there, and there was nothing worth molesting. Expecting to remain only a few hours, the family, half-clad, took refuge on the top floor of their house. Although they had plenty of money with them they had no food. These ten creatures tasted neither food nor drink from Tuesday, the 11th, to Friday, the 14th, with the exception of an infant at the breast. Below and around them they saw the fire raging and the mob pillaging, and they huddled together with fear. They gradually became incapable of thinking about their own safety, and without hope were resigning themselves to a lingering death. On Friday, the 14th, a gentleman was passing the house, and saw the father signal to him with a baby at the window. He immediately rendered assistance, and rescued the whole family from their terrible position, but with great difficulty, owing to their extreme weakness. The gentleman succeeded in marching the family to the landing place and getting them on board the steamer "Moidari," where they are at this moment gradually recovering, thanks to the kindness of all concerned."

**GENERAL NEWS.**  
One day last week 126 bushels of strawberries were shipped from Clifton, N. B., to Boston and Halifax.  
James McAvity, of St. John, N. B., and others, citizens of Lincoln, purpose organizing a corporation to manufacture pulp and paper on the water power at Lincoln Village, Sanbury Co., N. B., with a capital stock of \$75,000.  
Lord Albert Pelham Clinton, uncle of the Duke of Newcastle, is "wanted" at a London Police court on a charge of obtaining £300 on a cheque on a bank where he had no funds; and it is further alleged that "this is not an isolated transaction."  
Two hundred refugees were saved during the bombardment of Alexandria in the Catholic chapel by the ingenuity of the Arab door-keeper, who told the soldiers that the place was empty, and there was nothing to steal or he would have taken it himself.  
M. de Candolle, an eminent French naturalist, in an article on Darwin, remarks that nearly all *litterateurs* and men of science of the first rank have lived, during part of the year, at least, in a town. One can hardly cite more than two exceptions (and they are very different), viz., Voltaire and Charles Darwin.  
Writing of Gilbert and Sullivan's new opera, Howard Paul says:—"I hear that the libretto of the new opera to follow 'Patience' is whimsical to the last degree, and that the music keeps step with the words. From the rising of the curtain to the concluding chorus it is a great long gulf, bursting with animal spirits, and overflowing with fun and the most daring of humorous situations."  
Mr. Henry Irving has relinquished the idea of visiting America this summer in advance of his engagement to act here next year. "He was to have been the guest of Mr. Vanderbilt," says London *Truth*, "but finding that the privacy of such a trip would have been interfered with, Mr. Irving has wisely determined not to go to America until he starts to act with Miss Ellen Terry and his company."  
Prof. Baden Powell, an eminent scientist, shows that the dangers of ballooning are exaggerated. In England there have been only six deaths in some 6,000 ascents, and four of these deaths were due to passengers jumping out or being thrown out of the car and coming into collision with some object in a violent wind. A couple of cords twisted around the car lines would have prevented this.  
It is satisfactory to learn that the Mexican Government has taken measures to assure the Central American States that there is no foundation in the reports which have been recently spread of hostile intentions on its part. General Lozano, it appears, has received orders from the President of Mexico to make a tour through Guatemala and the other Central American republics for the purpose of restoring confidence and cementing friendship with them.  
A glance at the British army estimates reveals the fact that while the total force numbers for the current year 563,818, only 176,000 are regulars. The Indian army, which has been reduced since Mr. Gladstone took office, numbers about 60,000. The estimates provided, in addition, for 139,111 militia, 14,511 yeoman cavalry, and 245,643 volunteers. A fourth class of the reserves, known as the "pensioners and army reserve force," numbered 47,000.  
There is trouble in Iowa over the Prohibitory amendment to the constitution. An exchange has the following:  
"Were the liquor law in that state to be strictly enforced, no wine could be obtained for communion services, as there is no exception to the prohibition. The churches are in a quandary as to their duty in the matter, and it is likely that in most instances unferruled grape juice will be used instead of wine, but the Presbyterians in Vinton have voted to defy the law, and to indemnify the druggists who sell to them."  
The last time the stockholders in the Keely Motor Company demanded definite knowledge of the invention, Keely offered to divulge the secret to any one man whom they might select, and whose report, which should not go into particulars, they must accept as all the revelations they would get. A few accepted this proposal, and were induced to choose Mr. Boekel, a practical machinist. That was three months ago. Boekel goes into the shop with Keely several times a week, the doors are carefully locked, and then noises like explosions are heard from the machine. They are also presumed to be big firecrackers, set off to delude the hearers. Boekel has become as mysterious as Keely, and it is feared that the courts will have to be called upon to make him divulge what he knows.  
The sardine last year, by failing to make its accustomed appearance off the coast of France, caused very serious loss and hardship to thousands of fishermen, and it was feared that it might never return to its old hunting grounds. Scientists discussed the matter, and the suggestion was made, and received much support, that the Gulf stream had probably changed its course, and taken the little fish with it; perhaps permanently. This would have inflicted a fatal blow to a large and valuable industry, and would have caused a regrettable gap in the sardine supply. The expectation was general that there would be no appearance of them the present season, at any event; but it turns out that the forebodings were unfounded. Large schools of the fish have suddenly gladdened the eyes of the French fishermen. The Bay of Belle Isle is alive with them. And the cause of their absence last season remains obscure.
