Laniel Gov't Debate Continues

PARIS (Reuters) - National Assembly opponents of French Premier Joseph Laniel are demanding to know whether he is modelling his Indo-China policy on that of the United States.
In the second day of a showdown debate which may bring down the Laniel government, Socialist deputies Wednesday also shouted that the government "is not to risk a total extension of France war against the Communist-led Vietnam in Indo-China." They were criticizing moves at the current Geneva conference by Foreign Minister Georges Bidault, the chief target of opposition criticism. Bidault has sought U. S. intervention in the war.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. ALEXANDER MACDONALD
The community of Pleasant Valley has lost a highly esteemed citizen in the person of Mr. Alexander MacDonald, who passed away at the P. E. Island Hospital on April 28 after a brief illness. He had entered hospital about a week previously, bright hopes being held out for his recovery.
Born at Pleasant Valley on Jan. 1, 1886, Mr. MacDonald was the second eldest son of the late Donald and Isabella MacDonald. He suffered the loss of his father at a tender age, and assumed the management of the farm while yet young, supporting his widowed mother, brothers and sisters. In 1918 he married Miss Margaret Todd of Breadalbane, and their home was a centre of hospitality for old and young.
Possessed of a brilliant mind, Mr. MacDonald was a keen student of literature and was particularly well versed in the Scriptures and in the poetry of Burns, from both of which sources he could quote fluently. He was a regular attendant at St. Andrew's Day dinners, where he enjoyed meeting his fellow clansman of the Caledonian Club. Most of all, Mr. MacDonald possessed a genius for friendship, and was held in the highest regard by all classes.
He is survived by his widow and two sisters, Mrs. Annie MacKay, Breadalbane, and Mrs. Malcolm O. MacDonald, Caledonia; also by one brother, Mr. A. B. MacDonald, of Galt, Ont., who arrived home shortly before his passing. Three brothers predeceased him: Kenneth, who died in New York in 1902; Murdoch, who passed away at home in 1906; and John W., who enlisted as a law student in Vancouver at the outbreak of the First World War and was one of the first Islanders to make the supreme sacrifice, being mortally wounded at the battle of St. Julien in May, 1915.
Mr. MacDonald's funeral was held on April 30, followed by service at the Breadalbane United Church of which he was a loyal supporter. The service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. E. MacPhail, assisted by Rev. A. R. Wallace, a former pastor and friend, Rev. A. S. Weir, D.D., and Rev. Alexander MacKay. Hymns sung were "The Lord Is My Shepherd" and "Abide With Me." The honorary pall bearers were Messrs. Angus MacDonald, James W. MacDonald, Norman MacDonald, John D. MacDonald, Angus B. MacDonald, John A. MacDonald, John A. MacInnis, Walter MacKenzie, John B. MacKay, and Thomas Wigmore. The active pall bearers were Messrs. John Hagan, Herbert Proffitt, Roland Matheson, John Campbell, Donald Barlow, and Charles Robertson. Interment was in the Breadalbane Cemetery.

Charges CMHC Prefers Oil To Coal Equipment

OTTAWA (CP)—A government spokesman says Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation gives oil burning heating equipment preferred treatment over coal burning systems.
Maurice Bourget, parliamentary assistant to Works Minister Winters, made the statement Wednesday in the Commons in reply to a question by Clarie Gillis (CCF—Cape Breton South). Mr. Gillis asked if the National Housing Act compelled builders to install oil burning systems.
"The function of the corporation under the new act is to determine the value for lending purposes of a proposed house," Mr. Bourget said. "In determining the value the Corporation takes into account not only the land and structure but the equipment that is to be placed in the house as well.
"The equipment is selected by the borrower and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation determines the loan value on the basis of the value or cost of the equipment without discrimination as to the type of fuel to be used."

Sterling Area's Reserves Increase

LONDON (Reuters)—The sterling area's gold and dollar reserves fell by \$185,000,000 to \$2,985,000,000 during May, the treasury announced Wednesday.
It compares to a \$135,000,000 increase in April, halted then as the biggest gain for any month since 1950.
But financial experts pointed out that a large proportion of the May total was registered in the first few days of the month at a time when a currency speculation boom in the pound sterling was just ending. They forecast a quiet period with no major gains or losses in the reserves.
Of the May increase \$6,000,000 was due to United States defence aid. Another \$39,000,000 was received from the European Payments Union.
This left \$120,000,000 as the real measure of the sterling area's gain in transactions with the dollar area.

Farmer Becomes New Minister Of Mines For Quebec

QUEBEC (CP)—William N. Cottingham, Union Nationale member for Argenteuil, has become Quebec's mines minister, succeeding the late C. D. French.
The 49-year-old English-speaking farmer from St. Jerome, Que., took the three traditional oaths Wednesday in the ornate office of Lieutenant-Governor Gaspar D. Fautoux, who presided at the ceremony in the presence of Premier Duplessis and a dozen cabinet colleagues.
Mr. Cottingham, mayor of his home town, had been reported in line for the post shortly after Mr. French died May 3.
A Presbyterian, Mr. Cottingham becomes the English-speaking protestant representative in the cabinet of this predominantly French-speaking, Roman Catholic province.
Mr. Cottingham and Mr. Duplessis talked privately for about 20 minutes and then both walked to the cabinet meeting room where the needed order-in-council for the appointment was adopted.
Mr. Fautoux first administered the oath to Leopold Deslles, deputy attorney-general of Quebec, who was appointed clerk of the executive council—the cabinet—last week.
Mr. Duplessis then called Mr. Cottingham to step ahead and take the oath not to divulge cabinet decisions.
Mr. Cottingham then signed the oaths.
It is the third time a Quebec minister has been chosen from Argenteuil county, a small riding on the Ontario border near Hawkesbury.
Mr. Cottingham was first elected in the 1948 general election, defeating a former Liberal cabinet minister. In 1952 he was re-elected.

Canadians Receive Honorary Degrees

NEW YORK (CP)—Two Canadians were among 34 notables who received honorary degrees at Columbia University's 200th commencement ceremonies Tuesday.
They were Vincent MacDonald, Nova Scotia Supreme Court Justice, and Montreal-born economist Jacob Viner.
MacDonald, who received a Doctor of Laws degree, was cited for his internationally-known skill as a lawyer, his services in labor relations councils, and for his distinguished career as a judge in his native province.
Viner, educated at McGill and Harvard, was honored for his role as United States government consultant on economic and tariff affairs, as a teacher, and as a delegate to important economic conferences. He received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

SUMMERSIDE FIRM AWARDED BIG ARMY CONTRACT AT CAMP GAGETOWN

Special grade will command a premium of at least two cents per pound buterfat over first grade which in turn carries a premium of three cents over second grades.

Testing Equipment

The new regulations specify that every dairy manufacturing plant shall provide complete Babcock testing equipment. All milk supplied by patrons to a dairy manufacturing plant must be weighed and sampled daily with care being taken to obtain representative samples which must be fully protected from extremes of temperatures. Mix brought to the plants may be graded as 'A', consisting of clean milk; 'B', consisting of fairly clean milk; or 'C', consisting of dirty milk as determined by the sediment test. Grade A and B milk that is not sweet and clean in flavour and Grade C milk may be rejected. In cases of arguments decisions of inspectors as to the test shall settle the matter.

Other Provisions

All cream supplied by a patron to a dairy manufacturing plant shall be sampled for the purpose of determining the butterfat content. Provisions are also made in the regulations for cleanliness of the cans used to hold the milk en route to the plant and for the cleanliness of the vehicle used as a transport.
In determining whether cream has been properly pasteurized it shall first be heated to a temperature of 170 degrees Fahrenheit and held there for 10 minutes with the Storch test considered a reliable one to learn if this has been done.
So far as cheese factories are concerned each of them must be provided with a curing room having shelves capable of holding at least 17 days make of cheese and equipped to provide a maintained temperature of 66 degrees or more during the fall and early spring months. Every cheese in the curing room must be turned daily. As with milk or cream gathering stations every effort must be made to ensure absolute cleanliness.
In butter making it is provided that a seven pound sample be taken from every churning and forwarded to a grading centre for the purpose of determining the percentage of salt, moisture and fat present. Where it is manufactured into one-half, one and two pound units the grade must be plainly indicated on the wrapper. And butter must not be sold as a premium in conjunction with orders for other goods, nor under the current jobbing price for any grade plus a reasonable retail charge.
