Delegates From Ten Provinces At W.M.S. Meetings

The launching of "Canada Year" is a feature of the annual meeting of the Dominion Board of the Woman's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada in session in Toronto from May 26th to June 1st.

Delegates from all ten provinces are present representing a membership of 218,000 in over nine thousand organizations of women, teen-age girls and children. Membership in the three Maritime Provinces is over 27,000. Mrs. James Laughland of Guelph, President, is presiding at the sessions. In attendance from the Maritimes are Mrs. A. J. Reynolds of Wolfville, President of the Maritime Conference Branch; Mrs. J. A. Nicholson of Milford, N. S., formerly of York, P. E. I.; Mrs. F. E. Boothroyd of St. Andrews, N.B.; Mrs. J. K. MacInnes of Sackville, N.B.; Dr. Florence Murray, well known missionary doctor of Korea, formerly of O'Leary, P.E.I.; Miss Edna McLellan of Noel Shore, N. S., and Miss Mary Thompson of Oxford, both of whom will be honored on retirement this year, and Rev. Hilda Johnson, B.D., Th.M. of Capard, N. S., missionary on furlough from India.

The work of the Society and the United Church as a whole in Home and Overseas Missions and in Christian citizenship will be demonstrated and discussed during the sessions. A tour of United Church Home Mission and Social Service centres was undertaken during the week-end. Noon hour devotions are being conducted by the Italian, Finnish and Japanese Ministers of United Church congregations in Toronto.

Dr. Malcolm C. Macdonald, associate secretary of the Board of Home Missions and author of a book on the subject, just off the press, "From Lakes to Northern Lights", will give an address at one of the public meetings of the Board. Dr. Macdonald is a native of Prince Edward Island. Pertinent Canadian problems relating to immigration, the sponsoring of displaced persons and the care of senior citizens, will be

Looking at the world scene, the delegates will hear Dr. Gordon Sisco speak on "The Church within the present international situation." W. M. S. Missionaries from Africa, India, Korea and Trinidad will report on their work and discuss general trends in the countries represented.

A round table discussion on "The Declaration of Human Rights" was presented on the first evening, following the president's able address on the theme, "What the Times Demand." The annual budget of the Society for the work of the present year is \$1,080,000. Of this amount, \$113,000 is expected from the Maritime W. M. S. organizations.

MR. THOMAS MIDDLETON

Link with the old days of rating overseers has been broken in Harwich, Eng., by the death of Mr. Thomas Middleton, father of Mrs. W. T. Cullen, Hillsborough Street, who several weeks ago received word of her father's passing. Mr. Middleton held the office of rating overseer for many years until it ceased to exist under changing legislation. Mr. Middleton, who was eighty-four, was a well-known personality at Harwich where he was in business for a number of years and had been closely associated with St. Nicholas Church. Formerly church secretary, Mr. Middleton became a sidesman and held this office until the time of his death. He was also a former secretary of the Unionist Working Men's Club of Harwich. Mr. Middleton kept a ship chandler's business at Harwich, probably the only one of its kind left in the country with the exception of one which is known to exist at Ipswich, England. Mr. and Mrs. Middleton had been married for 53 years. He is survived by his wife, three daughters and a grandson.

The funeral took place at St. Nicholas Church, Harwich, the service being conducted by the vicar, the Rev. J. S. Hole. Immediate mourners were Miss Olive Middleton, Mrs. N. A. Morgan, daughters, Mr. A. Middleton, Mr. W. Middleton, nephews, Mrs. W. Sallows, Miss L. Middleton, Miss M. Middleton, nieces, Mrs. W. T. Cullen, daughter, Charlottetown, P. E. Island, who was unable to be present.
