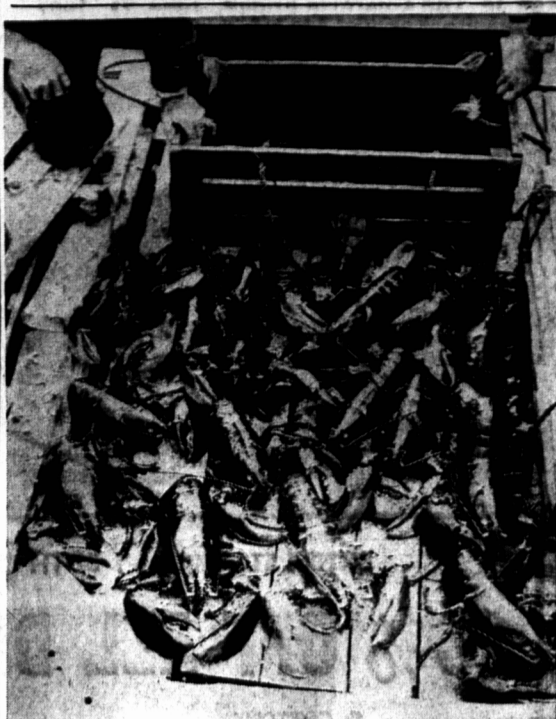
Prior to the exercises the grade ten graduates were tendered a banquet in the basement of the church, sponsored by the Catholic Women's League.

## Large Home And Apartment Building Destroyed By Fire

Flames fanned by a strong westerly wind burned two large homes, located one mile west of Summerside, yesterday afternoon about 3:00 o'clock. The fire, of undetermined origin, caused damage estimated at over \$40,000 and which took with it most of the contents of both houses.

The homes, one of which was an apartment building containing 4 apartments, were owned by Mr. M. L. (Wally) Walwyn, owner of Floral shops in Summerside and Charlottetown, as well as maritime Greenhouses Ltd.

Only one family, Mr. Jerry Reid and his wife, occupied the apartment building where the fire originated. But no one was home at the time of the outbreak and only a very few items were saved. The houses were located about 25 yards apart.

The Walwyn residence, of 11 great danger at first, but as the wind-swept flames were directed toward the house by the strong breeze, efforts were made to remove some effects from the home. Volunteers did manage to retrieve some furniture from the living room but could not enter the kitchen due to the intense heat. Both houses were equipped with asphalt shingles.

The Priory, about 75 yards to the East, where the Sisters of St. Martha reside and who operate the Catholic Welfare Bureau, was also in danger on occasions due to the shifting winds, but no damage resulted. The Maritime Greenhouses, Ltd., located a few yards to the rear of the apartment building, were also undamaged having been protected from the heat by the strong winds blowing away from them.

The Summerside Fire Department was assisted by the R.C.A.F. Fire Section. As there are no hydrants in that area, eventually a hose was run to MacQuarrie's Pond, about one-quarter mile distant. The firefighters were still endeavouring to subdue the smouldering debris up until 9:00 o'clock last evening.

Traffic congestion interfered with the running of the hose to MacQuarrie's pond and R.C.M.P. Officers had to divert traffic to assist the busy firemen.

## Outgoing CNR Shipments Show Increase During May

The Canadian National Railways forwarded almost 100 more carloads from Borden to Cape Tormentine during the past month than in May, 1956, according to the May, 1957 monthly statement released by the Office of the Superintendent.

1,401 carloads were shipped over the above route during May, 1957, as compared to 1,311 during May, 1956. Conversely, less carloads entered the Province during the past May, the figure being 1,831 with that of May, 1956 at 1,976.

Following are comparative figures for the two periods of goods shipped in considerable quantity. The figures for May, 1957 follow the stated goods, those for May, 1956 appearing in brackets:

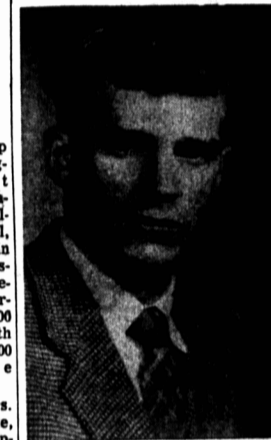

## 80 Years Since Saint John Fire

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—This venerable port city has an anniversary today, but nobody is celebrating it.

Eighty years ago today the old Saint John Telegraph put out a one-sheet paper completely filled with news of the holocaust that had broken out late the previous day.
