MEETING
AT GUELPH

Great Live Stock
Exhibition.

VALUABLE OBJECT
LESSONS.

Visitors Present From
all Parts of Canada.

LECTURES BY LIVE STOCK
SPECIALISTS.

Right as Well as Wrong Kind
of Bacon Hog.

[Special correspondence of THE EXAMINER.]

The fat stock show opened on the 11th at 8 o'clock in the morning.

The vast building in which it is held is a new one, only just completed. It affords every facility for showing the great number of stock that are on exhibition.

In cattle, sheep and pigs there are 1,000 entries. These are all shown on the ground floor in stalls and pens which are the very ideal of comfort.

The building is heated throughout with steam. At the end of the cattle compartment there is a large enclosure for judging. This enclosure is surrounded on two sides by seats on the plan of a grand stand at exhibitions, which will seat several hundred people who can watch the judging as it proceeds.

Again at the extreme end of the building is the lecture room into which the first prize animals are taken. Here an expert judge goes over their different points in the

presence of large crowds of farmers who are seated on another grand stand in their hearing.

The upper floor of the building is devoted altogether to poultry, dead and alive. In poultry there are 2,000 entries of perhaps the best collection of birds to be seen in America. The maritime men here begin to think they never saw a poultry show before, taking both numbers and quality into consideration.

The display of dressed poultry is splendid, the birds being put up as required for the English market. Lectures have been delivered at intervals each day,—so far on cattle sheep and swine by the most prominent breeders and feeders in each of these lines.

A lecture was delivered the first night of the show by J. E. Breathuer, the noted Yorkshire breeder. He had on the platform on which he stood a perfect specimen of the bacon hog—a Yorkshire—and a specimen of an under-fed Tamworth and also a specimen of an over-fed Berkshire. The lecturer was able in this way to give his audience a very striking illustration of the right kind as well as the wrong kind of a bacon hog.

I noticed that what he gave us as the highest type for bacon was not nearly so fat as the average hog that goes to the P. E. Island pork factory.

To-day we listened to several lectures on cattle, with the first prize animals standing beside the speaker. The speaker in every case was an expert judge, and he explained why it was that this particular animal got first place.

Such object lessons cannot fail to be a great education to all who handle live stock.

To-morrow the cattle, sheep and hogs that were first in their class alive will be judged by the block test, and the good and bad qualities will be pointed out to the people by expert judges,—who will view them from a consumer's standpoint.

This show, as it is conducted, is the greatest educative institution for farmers in Canada, and all who attend will carry away ideas that will be of use to them and their neighbors who may get information from them.

While here the Maritime contingent have individually been receiving nothing but kindness from the citizens of this beautiful city. But this evening, the whole contingent received a royal welcome in the parlors of the Wellington Hotel from the Mayor and Aldermen of Guelph.

One of the Aldermen occupied the chair, and Mayor Nelson delivered an address of welcome, which was replied to by Hon. Mr. Farris of New Brunswick, E. B. Elderkin, of Nova Scotia, and F. L. Haszard, of P. E. Island. The Hon. Mr. Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, was present and delivered an eloquent and appropriate address. Mr. F. W. Hodson also made a happy little speech. The delegates were then treated to liquid refreshments and cigars. It was a very pleasant hour, and made us Maritime men feel very kindly towards our brothers in the West.

An excursion is being organized to go to the "Falls" of Niagara, and most of the Maritime men will go. Tonight a mass meeting takes place in the City Hall to welcome all the visitors to the fairs to the city.

We are meeting people here from all parts of the continent, as this show already enjoys a continental reputation.

We visited, this morning, the dairy and beef stables in connection with the Ontario Agricultural College, and found everything in first-class order with all up-to-date appliances, even to a milking-machine.

The milking herd kept here contains many good animals. Their milk and butter record for last year is posted up in front of their stalls. The highest record we noticed was for a grade Saurohorn cow that gave 8,140 pounds of milk in the year, which made 416 pounds of butter. The next highest was a Holstein that gave 9,000 pounds of milk and made only 230 pounds of butter. Guelph, Dec. 12th, 1900.
