EXPERIMENTAL FARMS REPORT

The Report for 1900 which has been somewhat retarded in publication, is now out, and as usual is filled up with a vast amount of useful and interesting information for the farmer. The volume contains the usual Directors' Report, which is a most learned work, as well as those of the Agriculturist, Horticulturist, Entomologist, Poultry Fancier and Bee Keeper. It has also a record of the experiments carried on on the branch farms of Nappan, Brandon and Aggazis. In his crop report the director gives those two island summaries of last year's crop, which will be regarded as conclusive:

"Alberton, P. E. I., October 31.—Seldom has Prince Edward Island garnered a more satisfactory all round harvest than this year. Hay is bursting the mows, the granaries are filled with golden grain, and although in some sections potatoes are not an average crop, on the whole we rejoice in an excellent yield of roots."—REV. A. E. BURKE.

"Pleasant Grove, P. E. I.—The wheat crop on the whole is a good one; some fields were damaged by what we call 'black neck,' said by some to be the rust. Attacks by the Hessian Fly were not common, a few plants being injured, but we have had a considerable quantity of Wheat Midge on the island this year."—E. WYATT.

Professor Fletcher's report on insect pests and weeds is most interesting. Everybody should have a copy of this work, and if not on the mailing list of the Farms already, should send his name and postage fees to the Director. The public pay for the report and have a right to it.

BIBLE STUDY.—The examination upon Hurlbut's Normal Lessons will be held at the home of Rev. G. P. Raymond, Queen Street, on Thursday, September 20th, beginning at 3 p. m. The examination will cover the entire text book, and will consist of twenty questions, distributed as follows:

Bible books and history five questions.
Bible geography five questions.
Bible institutions five questions.
Sunday school teacher and pupil five questions.

Each question answered perfectly will count twenty, so that a perfect paper will count 400. A total of 250 will entitle the examinee to a Prince Edward Island Sunday School Association diploma, which will be presented at the annual Sunday School Convention to be held in Charlottetown October 8th and 9th. This examination paper will probably be set and marked by leading educationists of Charlottetown, and is open to any person who may be prepared to take it. Any one unable to take the examination at the time herein specified may make arrangement with Rev. G. P. Raymond for a private examination any time before September 25th.
