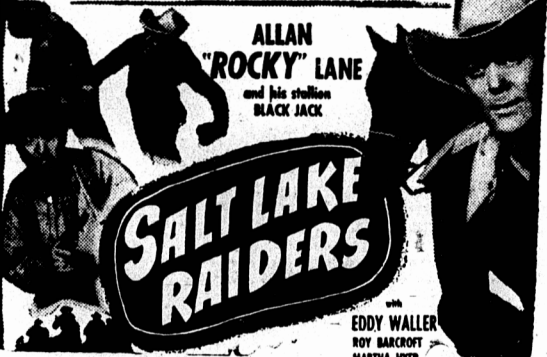

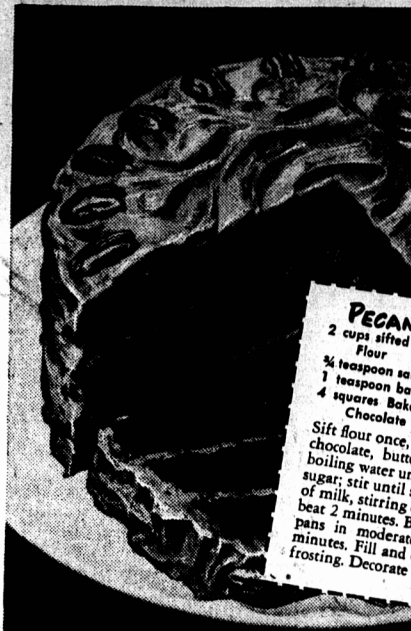
CAKE TALK by Frances Barton

CAKE SERVING

Starting at the outside of each cut, cut to halfway down the adjoining piece, as in dotted line.

For 32 pieces, make 8 cuts first, then cut diagonally half-way down each adjoining piece.

1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
