

Authority On R. C. Liturgy

MONTREAL (CP) — Rev. Marcel Dubois, of Ste. Anne-de-Beaupre, Que., has been named to the Pontifical Academy of Liturgy, it was learned Wednesday.

The 36-year-old Redemptorist is the first French-Canadian to become a member of the academy, the highest authority in liturgy next to the Sacred Congregation of Rites.

A native of Montreal, Father Dubois was ordained in 1946, after studying at Alphonse's Seminary, Ste. Anne-de-Beaupre. Following his ordination, he taught at the seminary until his departure for Europe in 1954 to pursue studies in liturgy and canon law.

During the course of his studies in Belgium, France, Rome, Egypt, Palestine and Greece, Father Dubois published three works on liturgy. The academy comprises 100 prelates and priests of different nationalities.

Quebec Steel Plant Is Proposed

QUEBEC (CP) — Vice-President Herman M. Mawhinney, of the Steel Company of Canada said Tuesday there will be a heavy steel industry established on the Quebec St. Lawrence River shore.

Mr. Mawhinney told the Rotary Club there are already two plants making steel beams which will produce some 250,000 tons this year.

Bill To Ratify New Tax Treaty

OTTAWA (CP) — Finance Minister Harris introduced in the Commons Wednesday a bill to ratify a new tax treaty between Canada and the United States.

The treaty, amending the 1943 Canada-U.S. convention for avoidance of double taxation, was signed here earlier Wednesday by Mr. Harris and Livingston Merchant, U.S. ambassador. The new treaty becomes effective at the start of 1957.

A major clause reduces to 51 from 85 per cent the percentage of share ownership entitling a U.S. parent company to the reduced tax rate of five per cent on dividends from a Canadian subsidiary.

Purpose of this change is to encourage U.S. companies to give Canadian investors opportunities to purchase shares in their Canadian subsidiaries.

tax assessors plan international meeting this month

AUGUSTA, Me. (AP) — Canadian and American tax assessors will meet jointly in Fredericton, N.B., this month.

The Maine Municipal Association announced Wednesday that the ninth annual Maine Tax Assessors' School will be held in the Canadian city Aug. 27-31 in the first such international assessors' training project.

Instructors will be drawn from both countries. Meetings in conjunction will be the 11th New Brunswick assessors' school. Maine Governor Edmund S. Muskie will address a joint dinner Aug. 28.

Printer Dies

SYDNEY (CP) — Wendell D. (Bud) Barton, 51, Sydney commercial printer, died here Wednesday.

Manager and owner of Commercial Printers Ltd., Mr. Barton was a native of Fredericton where he started his printing career with the McMurray Printing Company.

He worked for a time with the Montreal Witness before returning to Nova Scotia. He was employed for several years as foreman with the Windsor, N.S., Tribune.

Mr. Barton came here 18 years ago and was on the advertising staff of the Sydney Post - Record (Cape Breton Post), before forming Commercial Printers Ltd.

TO TEST A-WEAPONS

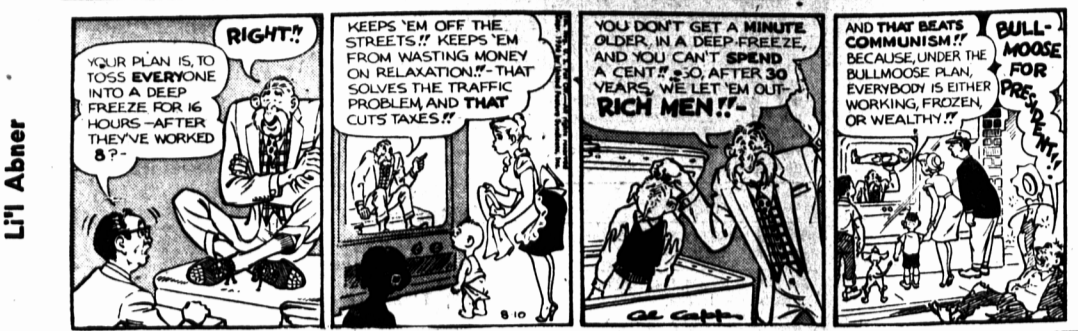
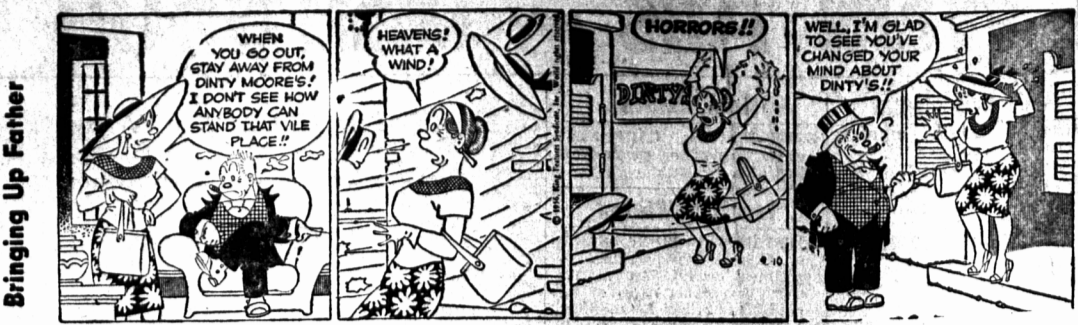

CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North	East	South	West
1♠	Pass	2♠	Pass
2♥	Pass?		

What do you now bid with each of the following four hands?

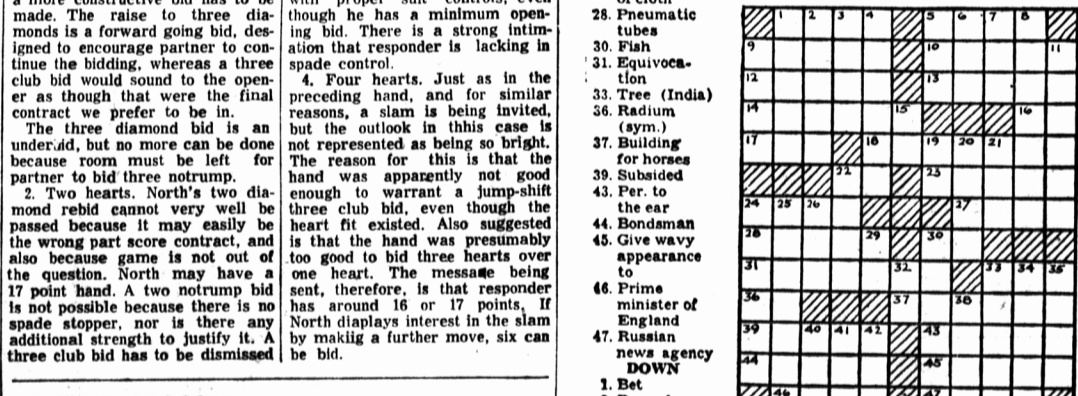
- ♠75 ♥A9 ♦QJ3 ♣KQ872
- ♠9763 ♥K8 ♦J4 ♣KQ975
- ♠94 ♥K7 ♦KQ83 ♣AKJ62
- ♠A83 ♥Q1072 ♦Q4 ♣AK97

QUIZ

- Three diamonds. Although it is desirable to bid to clubs again, a more constructive bid has to be made. The raise to three diamonds is a forward going bid, designed to encourage partner to continue the bidding, whereas a three club bid would sound to the opener as though that were the final contract we prefer to be in.
- The three diamond bid is an underbid, but no more can be done because room must be left for partner to bid three notrump.
- Two hearts. North's two diamond rebid cannot very well be passed because it may easily be the wrong part score contract, and also because game is not out of the question. North may have a 17 point hand. A two notrump bid is not possible because there is no spade stopper, nor is there any additional reason to justify it. A three club bid has to be dismissed because the suit, unsupported, is too weak to rebid.
- The final choice, two hearts, is unusual in the sense that there are only two hearts, but since the king is one of them, the holding is virtually equivalent to three small trumps. There is nothing forcing, or even encouraging, in the two heart preference bid.
- Five diamonds. This bid strongly encourages partner to contract for slam. A raise to three diamonds would represent a hand with a chance for game if North's opening bid is not a minimum or a raise to four diamonds commits the partnership to game even opposite a minimum; a raise to five diamonds asks partner to bid a slam with proper suit controls, even though he has a minimum opening bid. There is a strong intimation that responder is lacking in spade control.
- Four hearts. Just as in the preceding hand, for similar reasons, a slam is being invited, but the outlook in this case is not represented as being so bright. The reason for this is that the hand was apparently not good enough to warrant a jump-suit bid as though that were the final contract we prefer to be in.

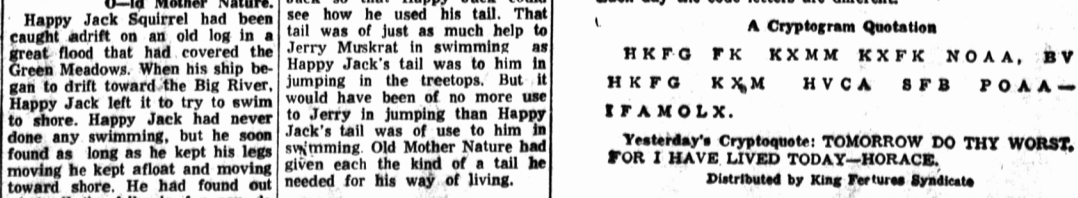

Britain Stresses Desire For Peaceful Settlement

LONDON (CP)—Britain today announced her intention to seek a peaceful settlement of the Suez Canal crisis rather than resorting to force.

The announcement from the foreign office followed shortly after India's Prime Minister, Nehru called upon both Britain and France to refrain from military measures in the Suez.

At the same time, Nehru announced India's acceptance of an invitation to the 24-power Suez Conference here next week.

A foreign office spokesman said Britain has felt and still feels that the dispute caused by Egypt's nationalization of the Suez Canal "should be peacefully settled."

Greece today asked Britain to postpone the Suez Conference and agree to holding it at another site. The foreign office spokesman declined comment on the request, but official quarters said there is virtually no chance of delaying the conference, scheduled to start Aug. 16.

PREPARE ARMADA

The emphasis placed on Britain's desire for a peaceful settlement underlined persistent reports here in the last 48 hours that the Eden government no longer feels itself free to use military measures unilaterally to enforce the internationalization of the canal.

Government spokesmen, however, have been taking pains to emphasize that there is no weakening of the British position.



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
