# Pete Kelly Wins Island Open; Dowling Runner-Up

Pete Kelly of Rathurst, N.B., won the Island Open Golf Championship and with the G.G. Wood Memorial Trophy over the weekend at the Charlottetown Golf Club.

Kelly finished with 220 and a two stroke lead over defending champion Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown. Art MacKenzie, won the best amateur award finishing with a three round total of 227.

Cecil Dowling and J.R. Smith of Truro were the first round leaders with a 71. Pete Kelly was the runner-up with a 75 while A. Oglivie, Moncton, J. Walker, Kentville and G. Andrew, Green Gables each carded a 79. Dowling shot into the lead in the second when he carded a 73. Kelly also carded a 73 and moved into the runner-up spot ahead of Smith who rose to a 76 to fall three strokes behind.

Kelly caught up with Dowling during the third round and coming up to the 18th hole held a two stroke lead over the Charlottetown pro. Both Kelly and Dowling used the same number of strokes to get the hole and therefore giving Kelly the title.

## Alouettes And Eskimos Lose To Tiger-Cats And Stamps

A hard-hitting Calgary team, taking advantage of every break, Saturday defeated Edmonton Eskimos 10-6 to move into a first place tie with the Grey Cup champions in Western Inter-provincial Football Union standings.

A crowd of 16,000 fans, largest in Calgary since Sept. 13, 1954 when Stampede last defeated Eskimos, watched the contest.

The Cats trailed 6-1 at half time, but they marched to victory with a stout defensive display which held Alouette quarterback Sam Etcheverry to only 10 completions in 30 pass attempts. They also turned one of three pass interceptions into a touchdown and capitalized on a pair of Alouette fumbles for majors.

In the first half the Cats made only 84 yards rushing and none passing. Cam Fraser's kick into the end zone gave them a 1-0 lead in the first quarter however. Hal Patterson gave the Alouettes the lead in the second quarter with a touchdown.

Cookie Gilchrist intercepted an Etcheverry pass on the Montreal five in three plays the Cats scored a major with Steve Oneschuk carrying the ball over the line. Oneschuk also kicked a convert and Cam Fraser kicked three singles.

Alouettes scored their only points on Hal Patterson's third quarter end sweep after the Montreal club marched 50 yards in eight plays.

The victory gave the Cats and the Als identical 1-1 records and tied them for second place in the league standings. The unbeaten Ottawa Rough Riders lead with two straight wins.

## Injured Climber Uses Teeth, One Arm In Perilous Descent

TERRACE (CP) — Dr. Sterling Hendricks of Silver Springs, Md., worked his way literally by the skin of his teeth down a treacherous British Columbia mountain to fetch help for two injured companions.

An hour before rescuers reached the two men at the 6,000-foot level of 9,000-foot Mount Howson in northern B.C., Maj. Rex Gibson, president of the Alpine Club of Canada, died from internal injuries.

With Maj. Gibson, of Saanichton, B.C., was Don Hubbard of Washington D.C., a scientist with the U.S. national bureau of standards.

Dr. Hendricks and Hubbard, recovering in hospital at Terrace, 80 miles east of Prince Rupert, B.C., told Sunday of the ordeal on the mountain.

"On the long climb down to camp for help I had to make my descents using only my one good arm and my teeth to hang onto the rope," Dr. Hendricks said.

"In one place that would normally have taken me five minutes to get down, I required more than an hour.

## Newsman Dies At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) — John S. Connelley, 45-year-old Ottawa newspaper man and member of the parliamentary press gallery died Saturday at Port Hope, Ont., hospital following a short illness.

Mr. Connelley, parliamentary correspondent for the St. John's, Nfld., Evening Telegram, was on his way back to Ottawa from a Western Ontario vacation when he became ill at Port Hope.

He had been in failing health in recent years.

The veteran reporter, before joining the Evening Telegram, had been on the staff of the Ottawa Citizen and the British United Press news service. He also at one time served on The Ensign, a Catholic newspaper, and operated a public relations service.

Born at Woodstock, Ont., he graduated from Laval University. He was married to Mary Flannery who died in 1954. Two children survive, along with two sisters and a brother, Gregory Connelley, Ottawa Citizen reporter.

The funeral is to take place in Ottawa.

# White Sox Gain On Yanks; Brooklyn Defeats Cards

Chicago White Sox bounced back within four games of first place New York in the American League race Sunday, sweeping a doubleheader from Baltimore, 6-2 and 3-0, while the Yankees were beaten in a single game at Detroit, 7-2. In the National, Milwaukee Braves moved 7 1/2 games out front again, ripping Philadelphia, 7-2, when Brooklyn defeated second-place St. Louis 6-5.

The White Sox, who also were four games back two weeks ago and who have a three-game crack at the Yankees starting Tuesday in Comiskey Park, won the opener on the three-hit pitching of Bob Keegan. It was Keegan's first start since Tuesday's no-hit performance against Washington. Jack Harshman and Bill Fischer then six-hit the Orioles in the nightcap.

Kansas City nudged Boston 3-2 and Cleveland swept a pair from Washington, 3-2 and 6-4, in the other AL action.

Boston's Ted Williams was hitless, skidding his AL leading batting average to .378—just two points ahead of Yankee Mickey Mantle, who was 2-for-3. Washington's Roy Sievers moved ahead of Mantle in home runs, blasting his 33rd, and in runs batted in, adding two for 89. The mick has 32 home runs 87 rbi.

GIANTS WIN

In the other NL games, New York Giants belted Cincinnati 9-1, and Chicago Cubs, after being held to four hits by Vern Law in

3-0 Pittsburgh victory, hammered 16 hits in the nightcap for an 8-2 romp.

The White Sox, who have won six straight, nailed two first inning runs without a hit and added a pair of unearned runs in the second as Keegan breezed, striking out four and walking none.

The 35-year-old righthander retired the first 10 before giving up one run on Bob Boyd's triple and an infield out in the fourth and the other on Al Pilarcik's fifth-inning home run.

Fischer blanked the Orioles on five hits after relieving in the third when Harshman went out with a strained back muscle. Bill Wight gave the Sox only four hits, but they broke it with three in the sixth on Sperm Lollar's bases-loaded single and a wild pitch—all with two out.

The Tigers tagged the Yankees' Bob Turley for a fifth defeat as Al Kaline went 4-for-4 with a pair of two-run homers. Southpaw Billy Hoelt, backed up by four doubleplays won his sixth with an eight-hitter and knocked in three runs with a bases-loaded double. Hank Bauer homered in the first for the Yanks, who have dropped four of six on the western trip.

16TH WIN

Warren Spahn kept the Braves rolling, winning his 16th. Bob Hazle, an outfield replacement, continued his heavy hitting with a pair of three-run homers. Hazle also had a single in three trips—for a .526 average on 30 hits in 57 at bats.

Spahn, who also homered, had a six-hit shutout until the eighth when Stan Lopata's 17th homer, with one on, capped the Phils scoring.

Sal Maglie saved it for the Dodgers, fanning Ken Boyer on the ninth with two runs in and the bases loaded. Gil Hodges' 21st home run and double drove in three runs for the Braves now within one point of the Cards and also 7 1/2 back of the Braves.

Sam Jones was the loser. Don Drysdale, Brooklyn's top winner, gained a 1-3 record.

The Giants rapped loser Hal Hal Jettcoat and four relievers for 15 hits with Don Mueller, 4-for-4, hitting two solo home runs and a pair of singles. Danny O'Connell also homered for the Giants, now just four games behind the Redlegs and Phils who are tied for fourth.

## U.S Joins Canada In Banning Use Of Bird Callers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States Friday lined up with Canada in banning the use of electronic callers by waterfowl hunters.

The department of the interior announced an amendment to the migratory waterfowl laws, effective for the 1957-58 hunting season, which it said is broad enough to apply to all migratory game birds.

The deadly effectiveness of electronic devices in calling ducks and geese to the hunters' guns and the potential threat of excessive kills brought about the order, the announcement said.

Canada recently announced a similar ban. Winston Mair, chief of the federal wildlife service at Ottawa, said then the move was prompted largely by experience in the U.S. Electronic callers had not been widely used in the Dominion but the ban was designed to cut them off before they could become a problem.
