HOCKEY.

Crystals Win the Trophy—score 5—3—2nd Abegweits Defeat the Stars—Score 7-6.

The Crystals won. The Island championship and trophy that the Abegweits and their admirers wished so dearly to remain in Charlottetown passed to the Crystals last night, after one of the best games of hockey ever played here. The pace was very fast throughout and both teams showed splendid endurance. Though individual play and one man rushes are not to be encouraged, still the play of this kind witnessed last night was in every way excellent. Combination play was skillfully and effectively used by both sides. Killing though the pace was, checking was not very severe. In weight the Crystals had the advantage and profited by it. Their agile opponents generally outskated them, but the Crystals' defence was admirable. Bethune, Howatt and Sullivan scored a goal each for the Abegweits. Grady, Baker, McArthur and Saunders scored for the Crystals.

The second Abegweits just succeeded in turning the tables on the Stars. When in the second half, the score stood 6-4 for the Stars things were blue. But the Abegweits fully deserve the name of whirlwind finishers, for in a very short time near the end of the game they ran up three consecutive goals. Previous to this the Stars had secured three goals in succession. The game was fast and interesting and was an excellent example of hockey. The final score stood 7-6 for the Abegweits. There was much dispute over the referee's decision, many claiming 7-7 to be the correct score. Mr. Geo. Roy refereed the senior match, and Mr. Grant of New Glasgow, the second.

The assemblage at the rink was one of the largest ever attending a hockey match.

OFF FOR AFRICA

Lieutenant Macdonald Was Given a Royal Send-Off.

The officers and members of the Caledonian Club met at the Club rooms last night, and at twenty minutes to ten o'clock were joined by the boys of the Highland Brigade of St. James' church, and headed by Piper Ferguson, marched to the railway station to bid farewell to their loyal fellow clansman, Lieutenant Macdonald, who was leaving by the mail special en route to South Africa to battle for the Empire. Upon arriving at the station the Club and Brigade formed up on the platform where Lieutenant Macdonald bade farewell to his fellow-clansmen and the boys of the Brigade and the large number of other friends present, after which he boarded the train.

As the train pulled out Piper Ferguson played suitable airs, and the gallant Lieutenant stood on the platform waving his adieux. The Club and Boys Brigade gave rousing cheers for Lieutenant Macdonald followed by cheers by the other citizens present.

It is thought that there were upwards of two thousand people at the station to see the gallant Lieutenant off.

Below is the address of the Caledonian Club, which was crowded out of yesterday's issue:

To LIEUT. J. A. McDONALD,
Charlottetown.

DEAR SIR,—It is with mingled feelings of pleasure and regret that the undersigned committee, acting on behalf of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island, address you on the eve of your departure for the blood-stained battlefields of South Africa. Knowing that your military aspirations were so keen that they could only be satisfied by active service in the field, we are pleased to see the early consummation of your wishes; but on the other hand we regret even the temporary severance of the ties of friendship which bound us so happily for several years past.

Your fellow-lansmen fully appreciate the many sacrifices which the depth of your devotion to the cause of the Empire impel you to make, but we look forward with hope to your early and same return to your native province, and your reunion with the club, whose interests were always dear to your heart. We feel assured that in whatever sphere of service your lot may be cast, you will act the part of a brave and true "Soldier of the Queen;" and, we also know that your qualities are such as will endear you to all with whom you may come in contact, the higher officers under whom you may be called to serve, as well as subordinate officers and privates, over whom you may be placed.
