### P. E. I. Premier & C. N. R. Head Share Limelight At Mod

ST. ANN'S, N. S. (CP) — The president of a railway and Prince Edward Island's premier gathered their clansmen around them Friday and lustily cheered each other as the 18th Gaelic Mod moved through its second day. The Gordons rallied behind president Donald Gordon of the Canadian National Railways, were outnumbered by Premier Alex Matheson's followers when the rival clans exchanged verbal bonons. However, Mr. Gordon's boisterous cheer leading made up for the lack of numbers. Both the men, whose physical statures towered over most others on the platform, were special speakers. The Mod's guest of honor was Douglas, 12th Marquis of Huntly, chief of clan Gordon, who brought greetings from Scotland to Gordons and other clans. Mr. Gordon said "today must, of course, be regarded as the highlight of the Mod's festivities for it is with great conceit that I call your attention to the designation of this day as Clan Gordon Day. I have the proud privilege of declaring it open." Mr. Gordon wore a Tam O'Shanter but Mr. Matheson made no attempt to don any part of the dress of his ancient ancestors. "It would take an awful lot of kilt to cover my knees," he said. Premier Matheson is about six feet, five inches tall and Mr. Gordon a few inches shorter.

### Famous Red Cap To Speak Here

Ralston C. Young, Grand Central's famous Red Cap 42 will be one of the speakers at the Fall Conference of United Church Men which will take place at Stanhope Beach Inn on the weekend following Labor Day. Mr. Young who is in great demand as a speaker all over the United States and in various Canadian cities last weekend accepted the invitation of the conference planning committee to tell the heart-warming and inspiring story of how a few people started a prayer group in an abandoned railway coach on Track 13 at Grand Central Station in New York City. In relating his life's story Ralston Young says, "As a Red Cap I was in a turmoil, so ashamed of the job I had, I thought it was a mule's job, carrying bags. I didn't count in the world." Through the efforts of a lay person he was brought to church after 18 years of being away from it. He describes his conversion which took place on that occasion as an electrifying experience and states,

"I think unless we have had this personal experience we ought to seek it. A MEMBER OF THE CREW Red Cap 42 says Christianity is like a railroad train but too many people are satisfied to be just passengers on the train. "We are not willing to be a member of the crew," he says. Ralston Young notes that not all people travelling through Grand Central Station are on their way to a honeymoon at Niagara Falls. Many of them are on sick calls or in deep sorrow. It is here that the Red Cap can offer some word of encouragement that will send them happier on their way. In concluding his story, Ralston Young says, "Thank God I am a Red Cap I can be of assistance to so many people. You see it's not a menial job any more. It's an uplifting job as a servant of the People."

### Shriners Hold Colorful Turnout In Charlottetown

The downtown business area of Charlottetown took on some of the aspects of a miniature Mecca early Saturday afternoon when more than 150 Nobles of the Ancient Order of the Mystic Shrine headed by the Oriental Band of Philae Temple Halifax, under the direction of Don Lowe, prominent musician of that city, were seen on parade. Prominently displayed in the colourful procession were the flags of the three countries in which Shrine Temples are located: U.S.A., Canada and Mexico. The 800,000 Shriners hold membership in 154 places in the U.S.A., nine in Canada, one in Mexico and one in Hawaii. Along the course of the procession from the Charlottetown Hotel to Prince of Wales College, where the Conferral Ceremonies were held, hundreds of citizens lined up to see the parade in which the Fez, Turban and colourful flowing robes of the Divan members and Arab Patrol were conspicuous. Following the first section of the ceremonies, which was conducted by Cecil Burke in charge of the Ceremonial Divan, the 15 new members made the journey over the Hot sands under the guidance of Ernest Donovan. **DINNER MEETING**  
Speaking at the dinner meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel under the chairmanship of illustrious Potentate Roy Bowman, His Honour Lieutenant Governor T.W. L. Linsty, Assistant Chief Rabbah of Philae who spoke in the highest terms of the warmth of welcome experienced when the Shriners meet here.
