Anglican W.A. of Diocese Holds 54th Annual Meeting

The 54th annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of England in Canada met for its opening session in St. Peter's Parish Hall on Wednesday afternoon, March 7th.

The address of welcome was given by Mrs. Blythe Murray of St. Peter's Evening Branch, and fittingly responded to by Mrs. W. J. Dennis of Port Hill.

Letters and telegrams of greeting were received from Mrs. Wodehouse, Dominion President, Mrs. Soward, Dominion Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. H. D. Raymond, Miss Audrey DeBlois and the various Diocesan Boards across Canada. In her inspiring letter, Mrs. Raymond, beloved Honorary President of the P. E. I. Diocesan Board, reminded us of Christ's command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" and His promise "Lo, I am with you always."

Greetings from the Thank-offering Secretary, Mrs. W. J. Paynter, whose absence from the meeting through illness was much regretted, were presented by her daughter.

Following the roll call of officers, life members, presidents and delegates, the minutes of the last annual meeting were read by Mrs. E. V. Bell, Recording Secretary, and approved.

The Diocesan President, Mrs. Cosh, in the opening remarks of her address referred to present world conditions as a challenge to Christians to go "all out" in Christian living and reminded all of Christ's command that we pray for our enemies. The meeting stood while the President spoke feelingly of the great loss sustained in the death of the Primate, Archbishop Kingston, and remained standing while loving reference was made to the passing of Mrs. J. T. Ibbott, Mrs. W. E. Bentley, Miss Emma White and Mrs. A. M. Large. Sympathy was expressed for Mrs. C. H. Coles, 1st Vice President, in her continued illness and regret that the meeting must be deprived of her helpful counsel. Regret was also expressed of the serious illness of Mrs. W. W. Clark, only surviving charter member of the P. E. I. W. A. Miss Margaret Cotton, Corresponding Secretary, has resumed her duties and all are looking forward to soon welcoming her back to meetings. In a most interesting report of the year's work, Mrs. Cosh welcomed several new branches and spoke of the splendid work carried on during the year by the various departments. It is gratifying to note that both the Thank-offering and United Pledge Funds are again over-subscribed. The President's report closed with an appeal for prayer that as W. A. members we may do our part in

bringing peace to this troubled world.

The Recording Secretary's report was read by Mrs. E. V. Bell and the Corresponding Secretary's report, in the absence of Miss Cotton, by Mrs. W. A. Smith, Assistant Corresponding Secretary. These were followed by a splendid and detailed financial report by the Treasurer, Miss Ada Harris.

Mrs. Cosh then warmly welcomed the guest speaker, Right Rev. R. H. Waterman, B.A., D.D., Bishop of Nova Scotia. Bishop Waterman paid moving tribute to the late Archbishop Kingston and spoke of the debt we owe to all those who have done their work well and passed on. It is our responsibility to carry on this work so that we may pass on the torch of the Christian Church, burning brightly, to those who come after us. The story of the Christian Church through the ages is of man learning to live at peace with his fellow man by learning to live at peace with God, and each generation has its part to play.

A pleasant feature of the afternoon's program was the presentation by the President, assisted by the Lord Bishop of Life Memberships to: Mrs. W. W. Owen, from Branch A of St. Paul's, Mrs. E. Malone, from St. Peter's W. A., and Miss Eleanor Clapp, the gift of her mother.

At the close of the meeting, tea was served by the ladies of St. Peter's W. A. and a social hour enjoyed.

At 8 p.m. a joint service for D. C. S. and W. A. was held in St. Paul's Church when the speaker was Bishop Waterman who was assisted in the service by the clergy of the diocese.

The second day of the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Diocesan Board of the W. A. opened with service of the Holy Communion at 7:45 a.m. in St. Peter's Cathedral when the celebrant was His Lordship, Bishop Waterman.

The business meeting re-convened in St. Paul's Hall at 10:15 with the 3rd Vice President, Miss Eva Dyer, leading the devotional period. The minutes of the previous day's meeting were read by Mrs. E. V. Bell and approved. Reports of the year's work were then given by the various officers.

Mrs. G. D. DeBlois, Educational Secretary, gave a most interesting report of that important branch of the work. She expressed regret at severing her connections with the Diocesan Board and paid tribute to the work being done by the Deputy Educational Secretary, Mrs. Hemming. She urged members to make greater use of the library. Mrs. Cosh thanked Mrs. DeBlois for her splendid work during her years in office. Much credit is due Mrs. DeBlois and Mrs. Hemming for their efforts which have made the study course this year so interesting and popular with the branches. Letters written by Miss Audrey DeBlois

have been very timely and helpful also. A visit from Miss Foerster, missionary to Japan, was greatly enjoyed and brought the work there vividly before us.

A most encouraging report of G. A. work was given by the retiring Secretary, Mrs. J. E. Harris. The visit of Miss Peggy Neve, Regional Supervisor of Girl's Work in Eastern Canada, to P. E. I. had been a great success. During her visit, a wonderful G. A. rally was held and later on a very happy camp at Crapaud was enjoyed. Mrs. Harris thanked Mrs. Champion, Miss Evans, Miss Harris and others who helped to make this work possible. She asked all to keep in mind the G. A. camp to be held July 2-12 and the leadership course to be held in Toronto which two girls from our Diocese may attend. Mrs. Cosh thanked Mrs. Harris and expressed satisfaction that as Lone G. A. Secretary she would be continuing her membership on the Board.

Mrs. Champion, Candidate Secretary, spoke of the possibility of new recruits for missionary work and asked the constant prayers of all for this important branch of the work. We have now a splendid new Anglican Training College in Toronto where candidates can be prepared for this great field of service.

The Living Message Secretary, Mrs. Geo. Rogers, once more reported an increase in subscriptions over the previous year and the Treasurer read a most encouraging report from the Thank-offering Secretary, Mrs. W. J. Paynter.

Mrs. S. Bryant, Dorcas Secretary, was complimented by the President on a splendid financial statement and detailed report of the work done by each branch during the year. There are 50 extra children in All Saints School this year and anything extra that can be added to the base will be appreciated.

Mrs. I. Horne, Little Helpers Secretary, in her report thanked the parochial secretaries for work well done and called attention to Little Helper's literature on the table.

Miss Maud Haslam, Prayer Partner Secretary, gave a splendid report of the work of her department and read a heart touching letter from one of her correspondents. Secretaries were urged to keep writing regularly to their Prayer Partners not expecting a reply more than once a year.

Mrs. M. Weeks, Junior Secretary, spoke of the growth of work among Juniors during the year and of new branches that have been organized recently at St. Paul's, Summerside and Port Hill.

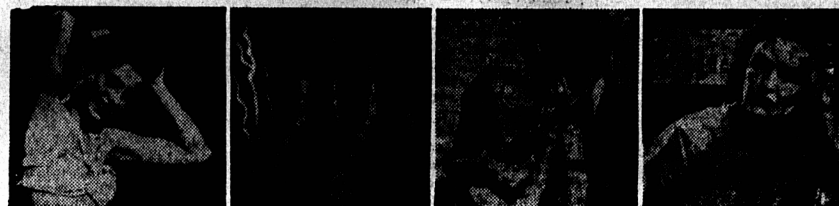
