

Black Hawks' Coach Confident Team Can Win

(This is the fourth of a Canadian Press series on pre-season prospects of the N.H.L. clubs, today's story is about Chicago Black Hawks. Tomorrow: New York Rangers.)

(Canadian Press Correspondent) NORTH BAY, Ont., Oct. 4 — (CP) — To maintain the high-scoring standard set by previous Chicago teams and at the same time tighten the defence — that's the program Eddie Goodfellow has mapped out in his new assignment as coach of the Chicago Black Hawks in the National Hockey League.

And Goodfellow, undeterred by remarks that he has inherited the toughest job in the N.H.L. — that of driving the Hawks to a playoff spot — figures he has the material to do it.

Last year Hawks took a \$25,000 gamble on goalie Frank Brimsek, but the load proved too heavy for one man. Chicago scored 203 goals, second best in the league, but had the most scored against them, 244.

"Less goals against us and more backchecking will be our theme this season," says Goodfellow.

Goodfellow is counting heavily on Chicago's newly-acquired goaltender and defencemen — Harry Lumley, Jack Stewart, and Al Dewsbury. Already he has paired Dewsbury with another outstanding youngster, Bill Gadsby, and he hopes the pair, who are 23 and 24 years of age, will be better than Toronto's efficient Mortson-Thomson combination.

The Chihawks feel they are all set in goal now for possibly 10 years, with Harry Lumley, at 24 a tested veteran of five N.H.L. seasons, in the nets.

Lumley, Dewsbury, Jack Stewart, Don Morrison, and Pete Bab-

ando came to Chicago from Detroit in a big summer trade which saw Hawks give up Metro Frystal, Gage Stewart, Bob Goldham and Jim Henry.

Stewart has been paired with veteran Doug McGaig and Ernie Dickens is the fifth man right now in the defence corps.

Goodfellow broke up the Doug Bentley-Bill Mosenko-Roy Conacher forward line and put Babando with Bentley and Mosenko. The line has clicked from the start, goes both ways and packs scoring power.

Roy Conacher and Adam Brown both veterans, have been the talk of the training camp here with their hustle, and have earned wing spots on either side of Morrison.

Both Conacher and Brown can put the puck in the net, and Morrison knows how to feed passes.

Goodfellow has called on Gus Bodnar to fill the centre slot vacated by Frystal and Gus has responded nobly. Working with him are Ben Guldolin and Bert Olmstead, the two remaining members of Chicago's "boltermaker line" of raise last season, which accumulated 66 goals.

Competition for fourth line spots has been keen, with the late purchase of Pat Lundy from Detroit giving an added fillip to the training camp. Outstanding candidates along with Lundy are Vic Stasak and Gord Fashoway, with Kansas City Mohawks last season, Jim Conacher, Eddie Leter, and Ray Powell. Jim Conacher was the only serious casualty of the training sessions, injuring his left shoulder severely. He was still on the sidelines when the team broke camp Tuesday.

Ralph Natrass has been dropped by the club. An outstanding defence prospect is Hugh Coffin, who'll play with Milwaukee Seagulls, Chicago's new farm club.

Eddie Goodfellow comes to the Black Hawks with a fine coaching record behind him at St. Louis, where he won one title with the Flyers and got them into the playoffs last season. George Carson, Flyer secretary, says Goodfellow will be the "coach of the year" in the National Hockey League within one or two seasons.

Doug Bentley, Roy Conacher, Adam Brown, and Bill Mosenko can be big wheels on this club if they can keep up their goal production," predicts Goodfellow, who added: "I'll keep 'em going."
