AMONG the passengers of the "Caspian" at Halifax, were Sir John Glover, K. M. G., Governor of Newfoundland, and Lady Glover, who are en route for Montreal on a visit to Sir Hugh Allan.

The following are the names of the gentlemen who, as before intimated, dined at Government House, Ottawa, on Wednesday last:—Hon. J. Fraser, Hon. Wm. Wedderburn, Hon. P. Landry, Hon. W. W. Sullivan and Col. H. Richardson.

MR. SERGEANT COX, who lately died in England, was about the fifth largest newspaper proprietor in London. He owned the "Field," which is immensely valuable; the "Queen," also a splendid property, and a law journal, which has a large circulation.

THE QUEEN, who was then at Balmoral, on the 21st ult., attended the funeral of the late John Grant, 25 years head game-keeper, who was a great favorite at Court. He was buried at Braemar. Wreaths of immortelles were placed on his grave by the Queen and other members of the Royal family.

JOHN DUNN, the Scots-Zulu Chief, is, it appears, to be decorated as a member of the Order of St. Michael and St. George for his services to the British Government during the late campaign in Zululand. There is no question as to the value of these services. They were most useful and important.

WE join the ranks of the "I-told-you-so's" in the matter of those November meteors. Didn't show up? Why, of course the didn't. Watched meteors never boil—we mean, fall. Next time a meteoric display is advertised, go to bed, and if there isn't a soul to look at them, the shooting stars will be out in full force.

UNPRECEDENTED wintry weather is reported at the present time in England. Traffic of all kinds in the north and in parts of Scotland is suspended by the snow drifts; canals are frozen over, and skating was commenced yesterday. During a heavy gale, numerous vessels have been driven ashore, among them H. M. S. "Valorous."

MR. AND MRS. LANGTRY are not coming to the United States at all; and that fact has been deemed fit to be telegraphed across the Atlantic. The inventions of science are certainly put to very queer uses. The photographers probably lose a handsome sum by this important decision on the part of the professional Beauty and her husband.

THE "VALOROUS"—The British frigate "Valorous," as called to the Halifax Mail, was driven ashore by the severe tempest on the English coast on Wednesday night. The "Valorous" is a frigate of 2,300 tons burden, 1145 horse power, and carries one gun. She was re-commissioned at Devonport for particular service on the 26th February, 1878.

THE President of the German Association of Ottawa waited on the Minister of Agriculture recently, on behalf of four German immigrants who recently arrived in this country, having been induced to emigrate upon the false representations of German steamship agents. Not long ago the same thing occurred with some Irish emigrants. It is safe to say that an order will soon issue from the Government holding all steamship companies responsible for the results of any such course of action on the part of their agents.

DR. HOLMES' BIRTHDAY.—The seventieth birthday of Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes was celebrated by a breakfast given at the Hotel Brunswick, Boston, on Wednesday, by Messrs. Houghton & Osgood, publishers of the "Atlantic Monthly." The guests were mainly contributors to that periodical, and embraced many distinguished names. Ladies were included. Dr. Holmes' response to the toast offered to him by Mr. Houghton was the reading of a poem entitled "Iron Gate," closing with an intimation that it was his last appearance in poetry. There was also a poem by Whittier, speeches and letters of regret.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.

The United States Government gives no explanation to the authorities here for placing an embargo on the exportation of Canadian cattle to American territory.

The work on the sections one and two, Lachine Canal, is completed, and the contractors are ready to hand the work over to the Government.

The seat for Russel County in the Local Legislature was awarded by the election court to Baker, the Conservative, on the ground that he received a majority of the legal votes cast.

The contractors on sections one and three of the railroad in British Columbia will commence work in February. Hardware and other supplies for one thousand men are now being purchased in Montreal. Chinese labor will be utilized.

TORONTO, Dec. 5.

One of the sneak thieves who robbed the office of Assistant Receiver General Fraser in this city in July of last year, has been arrested by the German police in Frankfurt on the Main, and the stolen notes and bonds found with him will be returned. The German authorities will themselves, it is said, attend to his punishment, so that his extradition will not be necessary.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.

Postmaster Van Horne, of Marksboro, New Jersey, was arrested yesterday charged with robbing the mails. Van Horne claims to be innocent.

NEW HAVEN, Dec. 5.

A man named Upton, arrested in Arsonir, came home drunk a few nights ago and, quarreling with his wife, hurled a lamp at her, which fell into the cradle, and set fire to the clothing covering the baby. The wife endeavored to extinguish the fire on the clothing, but she also caught fire and will probably die. The infant lived but a few hours. The couple are married only two years.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 5.

The boring of a tunnel seven miles long, for a permanent water supply, was completed yesterday. It is 12 feet in diameter and a million and a half gallons capacity.

DENVER, Dec. 5.

The principal business houses of Rostia were burned last night. Loss, \$26,500. Mrs. Margaret Tupey died at Flushing, N. J., on Tuesday, aged 110 years.

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 5.

There was a terrible accident in a grain mill at Brocton to-day. The flooring gave way, precipitating three men to the cellar, and five thousand bushels of corn fell upon them, smothering them to death.

EUROPEAN.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.

Thos. Brennan, an employee of a Dublin city bakery company, a leading land agitator and member of the land league, was arrested this morning and conveyed to Castlebar, charged with using seditious language at Balla and endeavoring to seduce the police from allegiance.

Brennan was received enthusiastically by a large crowd on his arrival at Castlebar, under the escort of the police. He was taken to the court house and examined. The indictment was read over to him, after which he was remanded till Monday. Bail was refused. Prisoner defended by Charles O'mally.

LONDON, Dec. 5.

Elliott has commenced training for his match with Boyd.

LONDON, Dec. 5.

The steamer "Angelia" was stranded in the Frith of Clyde. The crew and passengers have been taken off in a vessel, and tugs and lighters have been sent to lighten the cargo.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 5.

Steamship "City of Berlin" has been fitted with the electric light. If the experiment is successful, all Inman steamer will be supplied.

PESTH Dec. 5.

There has been a heavy snow storm throughout Hungary.

GERMANY.

BERLIN, Dec. 5.

The famine in Upper Silesia is so serious that in many villages over one-third of the population are starving. Distress from famine is appearing in Saxony among peasants and weavers.

CUBA.

MADRID, Dec. 5.

The Madrid Government has decided to dispatch several war vessels to Cuba.

Council of Ministers is held to-day to discuss the report of Senate Committee on the bill for abolition of slavery in Cuba, and should the Ministers approve of the modifications approved by the Committee in draft of Government's bill reports will probably be read in the Senate on Tuesday.

SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, Dec. 5.

The "Daily News" correspondent at Fort Webber, South Africa, reports that the Boers still talk of resistance and that Saecocent shows no desire to make peace.
