Heather Growing On Alberton Farm

True Scotch heather has been growing at Alberton for many years on a farm now occupied by Mr. Ben Profit. It is believed to have been brought to its present location by the parents of the late Mr. J. E. C. Hunter, who emigrated to Prince Edward Island from Scotland about seventy-five years ago.

Following the appearance of an article in The Guardian of Oct. 22 regarding the possibility of growing heather on the island, Mr. Wilfred Smith brought in some sprigs of what he claimed to be heather to The Guardian office at Alberton which were forwarded to Mr. B. F. Tinney at the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown.

In his reply Mr. Tinney stated that he believed the specimens to be Scotch heather and said that some of the material had been sent to Dr. Roland in Nova Scotia who was an authority on the plant. No reply has been received as yet. It could not be learned if the heather originated from cuttings, live plants or from seeds but the fact that this heather flourished for so many years at Prince Edward Island.

No Confirmation Of Rumored Change At S'side Station

No confirmation was obtainable from Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, C.D., commanding officer of the R.C.A.F. Station at Summerside, of a report yesterday to the effect that the Station is expected shortly to be changed from a training to an operational basis.

According to the report, No. 1 Air Navigation School and the Central Navigation School would likely be moved to Western Canada early next summer, and the Summerside Station would become an operational unit under the Maritime Group Headquarters at Halifax.
