Presbyterian Ritualism.

According to the Scotsman and the reli-
gious press of Great Britain, for some years
past, teaching termed "High Church" and
"Ritualistic" practices, have been steadily
growing in the Established Church of Scot-
land. Many Presbyterian ministers openly
claim to believe in and possess what is
called "Apostolic Succession," and their
teaching concerning the sacraments can
hardly be distinguished from that taught
by High Anglicans. In defence of their
position they appeal not only to the Bible
but also to the Confession of Faith, which
they assert maintains those views. In quite
a number of churches the principal holy
days of the Church of England are
observed, and religious seasons such as Ad-
vent and Lent. In a number of churches the
communion table has been placed back against
the wall and in some instances surmounted by
a cross. Many Presbyterians are becoming
alarmed, and the "Anti-Romanizing Church
Service Society" was organized a few years
ago to suppress these innovations. The
following extraordinary advertisement, in
prominent type, appeared in a recent number
of the Scotsman: "Great Protestant Dem-
onstrations (D. V.) to protest against Liturgi-
cal, Mass, Popish Images, Blessing Bells,
Popery in Scottish Hymns, Hallelujahs, the
Bible, the Mass, Africa; Ransoming Patronage
and Setting up Prelacy in the Church of
Scotland." It followed by names of speak-
ers and places and dates of meetings. The
prelacy and popery referred to is all in the old
Kirk. No reference is intended to the
Episcopal or Roman Catholic influence.

Inventor Watt's Vision.

IT CAME IN A DRUNKEN SLEEP AND MADE HIS
FORTUNE.

Before Watt, the discoverer of the present
mode of making shot, from his notable
dream, induced by over-indulgence in stimu-
lants, the manufacture in question was a
slow, laborious and, consequently, costly
process. Great bars of lead had to be
pounded into sheets of a thickness nearly
equal to the diameter of the shots desired.
These sheets had to be cut into little cubes,
placed in a revolving barrel and there rolled
until, by the constant friction, the edges
were off from the little cubes and they be-
came spheroidal.

Watt had often rucked his brains trying
to discover some better and less costly
scheme, but in vain. Finally, after spending
an evening with some boon companions
at an ale house, he went home, went to bed
and soon fell asleep. His slumbers, how-
ever, were disturbed by unwelcome
dreams, in one of which he was out with
"the boys," and as they were stumbling
home it began to rain shot—beautiful globes
of polished, shining lead—in such
numbers that he and his companions had to
seek shelter.

In the morning Watt remembered his
dream and it obtruded itself on his mind
all day. He began to wonder what shape
molten lead would assume in falling
through the air, and finally, to set his mind
at rest, he ascended to the top of the
steeples of the Church of St. Mary at Rad-
cliff and dropped slowly and regularly a
ladleful of molten lead into the street be-
low. Descending, he took from the bot-
tom of the shallow pool several handfuls of
the most perfect shot he had ever seen.
Watt's fortune was made, for from this ex-
periment emanated the idea of the shot tower,
which ever since has been the only means
employed in the manufacture of the little
missiles so important in war and sport.

Boxing for Boys.

[Harder's Young People.]

There is absolutely nothing in the way of
recreation so beneficial in every respect to
a boy as boxing. I am positive—and I
know whereof I speak, for as a boy and
man I have tried them all, fencing, wrestl-
ing, swimming, riding—that no one of
them has as many advantages of boxing. As
an all round developer it is unequalled; not
one of the boys' muscles remains inactive;
back, stomach, legs, arms, all are called
upon for vigorous service. But what I
consider the best feature in its recommen-
dation for the boys is the very thor-
ough drilling which the disposition
of the boy must undergo. If a lad is
quick to lose his temper, boxing will cure
him; it will teach him that no one who lets
his temper get the better of him will be-
come an expert sparrer; it will speedily
convince him of the absolute necessity of
keeping cool and in entire possession of his
wits in order to sustain his efforts and
avoid defeat. The boxer who cannot con-
trol his temper is practically at the mercy
of a cool, skillful opponent. One cannot
succeed successfully and become flustered. A
boxer must ever be on the alert, his wits
constantly alive, looking for an opportunity
of assault; he must be able to act instantly
and with cool deliberation, as distinguished
from wild, undirected action. He need do
no running to develop the muscles of his
legs or his lungs; these are all continuously
in action.
