

Tommy Ivan Reminisces About Great Gordie Howe

DETROIT (CP) — Tommy Ivan sat in the upper reaches of Olympia Stadium Monday and reminisced about the time back in 1946 when he was a paid employee of Gordie Howe's name entered the conversation.

Ivan is in the enemy camp now as general manager of Chicago Black Hawks, but he remembers telling the Detroit brass about Omaha in the United States Hockey League, who likely would move up to Indianapolis, then of the American League.

Howe was a fuzzy-cheeked winger with Omaha.

"I remember Jack Adams then general manager and coach of the Red Wings saying he wanted a list of players who could possibly make it with Indianapolis," Ivan said.

READY FOR NHL
"I gave him five or six names, and Howe wasn't included in the list. Adams wanted to know why I left him out because all year I had been sending glowing reports to him about the boy. I told him that here was a 16 year old who was ready for the big league."

Howe went up the next season and that is how the magnificent

right winger made it to the National Hockey League. Ivan, who coached Howe and the Red Wings from 1947 to 1955, winced slightly because just 15 hours earlier Howe had practically demolished the Hawks when he scored a goal and set up two others as the Wings beat Chicago 4-2 to cut the Hawks' lead in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final to 2-1.

"You know," Ivan said, "Gordie hasn't changed a bit from that time on, except that he has become more mature. He's still a big sweet guy."

He could have added that the six-footer from Floral, Sask., has installed himself as probably the greatest player to hit the NHL. He has been carrying the Red Wings on his broad shoulders for years and had one of his finest hours Sunday night — his 50th birthday.

Ivan was at Olympia, along with owner Jim Norris, to watch a few of the Hawks stage a brisk one-hour workout in preparation for tonight's fourth game. Chicago won the first two at home by 5-4 and 3-2 scores and took a beating from Wings and Howe in the third game.

WE'LL BE THERE!
"We'll be there tomorrow night," promised Hawks coach Rudy Pilous. "We'll show these people something."

Hawks, out-shot 48-21 Sunday night, must improve tremendously if they hope to take the fourth game. They were crippled by the absence of left wingers Bobby Hull and Ron Murphy and defenceman Al MacNeil.

Pilous said that Hull, who

suffered a broken nose in the second game, "definitely would not play Tuesday." Ivan, who admitted he had made arrangements to have a special plastic face-mask made for Hull, said the chances were "99 to 1" against Hull playing before Thursday's fifth game.

But the newspaper crowd around here, particularly the Chicago hockey writers said they would not be surprised if Hull dressed today.

That is an understatement inasmuch as the blood muscle man has scored a total of 182 goals in six NHL seasons including a record-equalling 80 a year ago.

The inquiry, designed to determine whether the evidence would merit public hearings, deals at the moment with professional football, college basketball scandals and the controversy now raging over charges that former Georgia athletic director Wallace Butts fed vital information to Alabama coach Paul (Bear) Bryant before their teams played last fall.

The teams return to The Sports Arena for the third and fourth games in the series Friday night and Saturday afternoon.

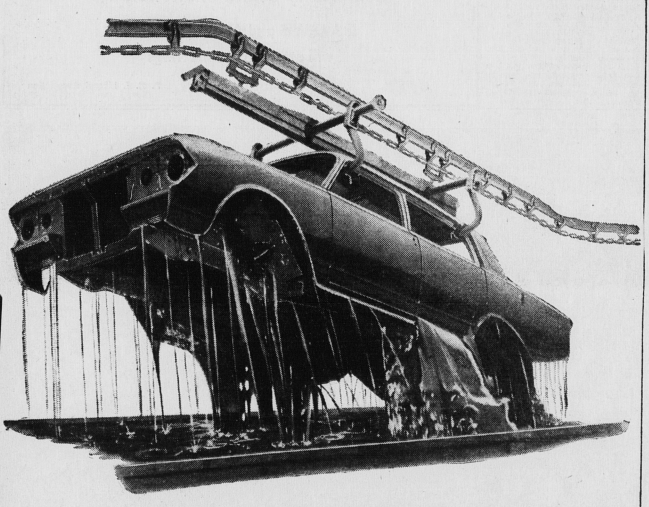
Royals won the N.B.P.E.I. crown last Saturday when they beat Fredericton Capitals 6-2 at The Sports Arena to give them the series three games to one.

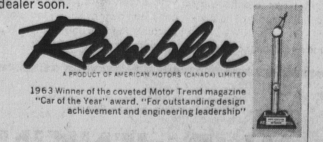

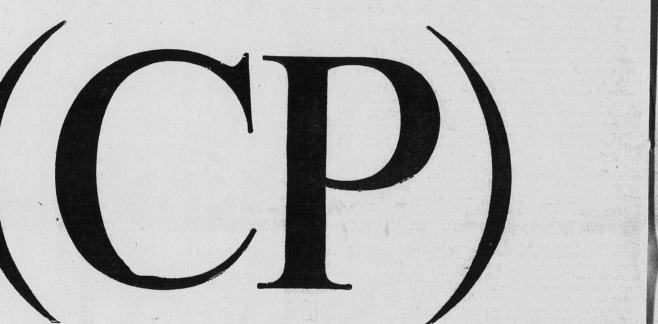
