MR. CHAMBERLAIN REACHES NEW YORK

Interviewed on Some of the Leading Topics.

GORDON'S DEATH AVENGED.

An Anglo-German Understanding Admitted-Czar's Proposal Made in Good Faith.

New York, Sept. 9.—The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the British Colonies, has arrived here. He was accompanied by his wife and Miss Chamberlain. They left later for Massachusetts, where they will visit the Endicotts, of which family Mrs. Chamberlain is a member.

THE CZAR'S PROPOSAL.

"What do you think of the Czar's proposal?" was asked. "I believe it was made in good faith, but of course, I cannot say whether it will be adopted or not.

"General Gordon's death has been avenged, and the power of the Mahdi has been destroyed. This victory will open up the Sudan, and all the countries of the world will benefit by the victory achieved by British arms.

"How about the Anglo-German agreement entered into by Mr. Balfour and the German Ambassador last week? Does the agreement embrace an offensive or defensive alliance in certain eventualities?"

ANGLO-GERMAN UNDERTAKING.

"All that I can say on the subject is that there is an understanding between the two countries, but I cannot tell you the details. I know of only two alliances existing at present, one is the dual alliance and the other is the triple alliance.

"Such an understanding is new to me. There were no negotiations of that kind in progress when I left England, I am not in a position to deny the report, because I cannot tell what has happened while on the sea.

"England's friendship for the United States during the conflict with Spain is known to the world," answered Mr. Chamberlain, in reply to another query.

"Are the English people notwithstanding the German and Russian agreements, still friendly to the United States?"

"Yes, and more strongly so. Ireland has been granted long-promised reforms and the people are happy. They all favour an alliance with this country.

Do come, I pray thee, common sense Come and this maid defend; Or else, I fear, her awful life Will have an awful end.

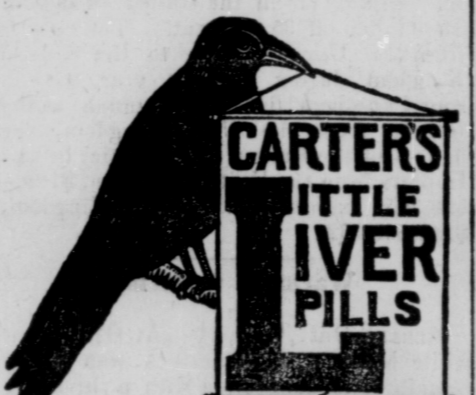
BREAD OF THE NATIONS

It is a curious and interesting study to compare the various materials which serve the different nations of the world as the basis of their bread.

Further north still bread is made from barley and oats. In Lapland oats, with the inner bark of the pine, are used. The two together, well ground and mixed, are made into large, flat cakes, cooked in a pan over a fire.

In some parts of Siberia, China and other eastern countries a fairly palatable bread is made from buckwheat. In parts of Italy chestnuts are cooked, ground into meal and used for making bread.

In Persia the bread is made from rice, flour and milk; it is called "lawash." The Persian oven is built in the ground, about the size of a barrel. The sides are smooth mason work.
