Strange But True

A voice link across the Atlantic ocean will be a reality by 1956 — a project that will provide the first physical voice link between the old and new worlds.
Jointly sponsored by the American Telephone Company and the British post office and the Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation, it is scheduled to be in operation by 1956.
Clareville, Newfoundland, is the site chosen to house the equipment to be used on this side of the big pond. Across the ocean Scotland will be the other housing site.
Direct land lines from Montreal and New York City will connect with the sea-going cable in Nova Scotia.
Laying the cable in the bottom of the ocean will be the \$64 problem and will pose many problems for the engineers. The actual cable laying will begin in the spring of 1955 from the British ship Monarch, the largest cable vessel in the world.
