THE market on Tuesday was fairly attended. Beef was plentiful. Hay and oats had a good demand. Prices are the same as on Friday last.

MR. AND MRS. GEORGE FORSYTH, of Halifax, took passage for England in the steamer "Prince Edward," which sailed Monday evening.

PARTRIDGE.—The demand for partridges in the Boston market is reviving and several large lots of the birds have been sent on from St. John.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The annual meeting of the Grand Division Sons of Temperance, of Ontario, closed on the 3rd inst., at Almonte. Sir Teonard Tilley was present at the morning session and made a few remarks.

ON account of the annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, the evening Advent service in St. Peter's Church (at 7 1/2 o'clock), will not be held on Wednesday evening next. The meeting alluded to will be held in St. Paul's School Room, Prince Street.

THE Newfoundlanders do Church bazaars, etc., on a big scale. St. Patrick's Church bazaar, recently closed at St. John's, the proceeds being \$10,000. Lotteries were the principal agency. The St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was opened on Sunday the 30th ult., and \$900 were taken at the morning and evening collections.

IN Champagne, France, a disaster has occurred unparalleled for sixty years. Not a bottle of wine has been harvested. The loss is terrible for the small grower. The grape did not ripen, and it has been gathered only in order to prevent trespassers from entering the vineyards and damaging the vines.

EXPORTING SHEEP AND LAMBS.—Last week Mr. Edward McDonald and Mr. L. McGrath sold two hundred sheep each to buyers from Boston, and Mr. Kane also disposed of about two hundred to the same parties. Hayes & Layden shipped two hundred to the States on their own account. This week, Patrick McDonald will ship five hundred, and Kane & Murray are making up a shipment of four hundred for the Boston market.—St. John Sun.

ANTHRACITE FROM AMERICA.—The Americans are threatening to send supplies of anthracite from Pennsylvania to Europe, and the French Vice Consul at Philadelphia reports that experimental shipments have shown that it can be transported and sold at a profit in France at from £1 to £1 4s. per ton. The anthracite beds of Pennsylvania are said to cover an area of 350 square miles.—Times.

TRIPLETS.—The wife of Mr. Michael McGrath, of New Canaan, Carleton Co. N.B., presented her husband some few days ago with three male children. They were to have been baptised on last Sunday. The matter will be laid before the Governor General, whose lady, it is understood, intends to follow the precedent of her illustrious mother in presenting the mother of the babes with £3.—Cor. TO VISIT ST. JOHN.—The St. John Reform Club have engaged D. Banks McKenzie, the great temperance speaker, for a short season, commencing on Thursday next. We notice that in addressing a public temperance meeting in Halifax on Wednesday night last, Mr. McKenzie said, "The general opinion abroad was that St. John, N. B., St. John's, Newfoundland, and Halifax, were the three most rum cursed cities in the world."

ROBBERIES.—On Monday evening at seven o'clock, the grocery store of Mrs. Patrick Boyle, situated on the corner of Grafton street and Davy's Lane, was entered by thieves. The till was taken bodily. It contained cash to the amount of forty-five dollars. Mrs. Boyle was in a room adjoining the shop and did not hear the thieves. She has no suspicion of them. The hatch was opened, the room was entered, and two bottles of confectionery were stolen.
