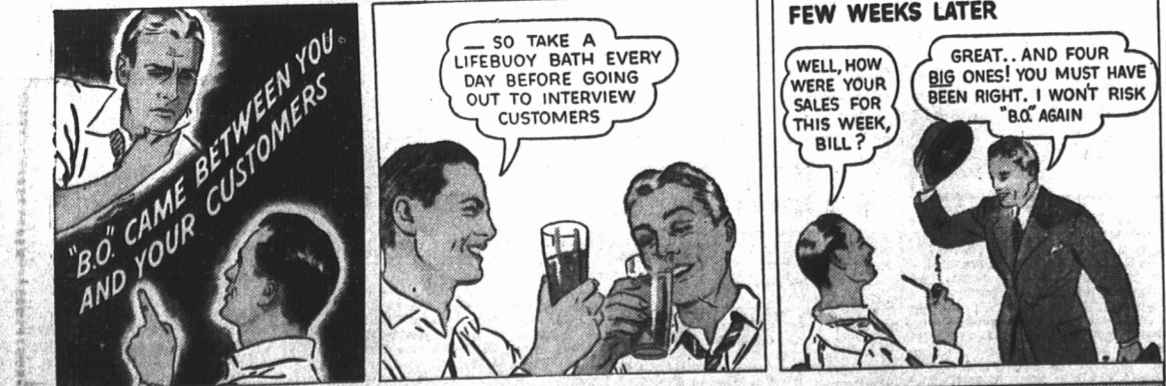
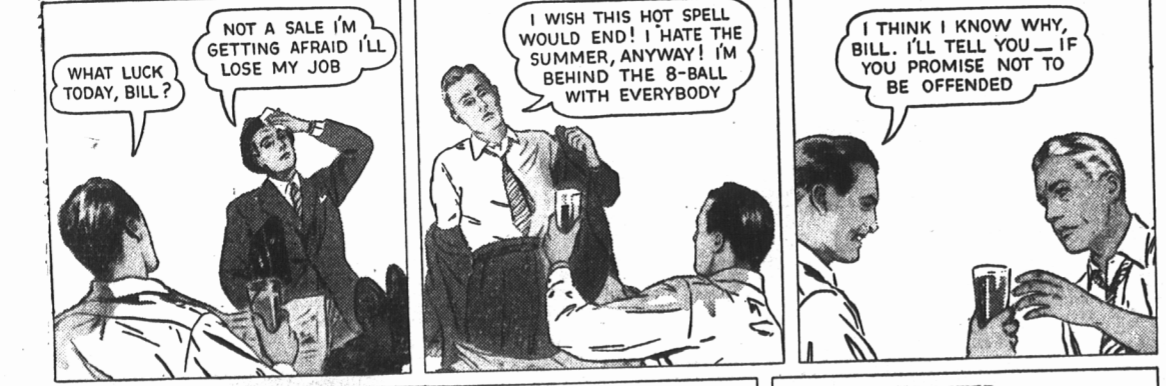

PEPPERMINT SANDWICHES

Place one cupful peppermint stick candy through the food chopper, moisten with two tablespoons peanut butter and mayonnaise to make a nice consistency. Spread between slices of rye, buttered bread, cut in rounds and serve for afternoon tea.

RASPBERRY CHARLOTTE

Whip 2 cups of whipping cream; sweeten and flavor with orange juice. Make a nice, light, round cake. When cool, cut carefully off the top a slice about 3-4 of an inch thick, and dig out the inside of the cake to make a container. Spread the inside of this container with some of the whipped cream, and fill it two-thirds full of sugared raspberries. Fill up the container with more of the whipped cream. From the centre of the slice which was taken from the top cut a round with a small cookie cutter. Lay the cover which you cut off back on the cake. Fill the open space with more whipped cream; and lay on the piece which was cut out on a glass plate and chill thoroughly.
