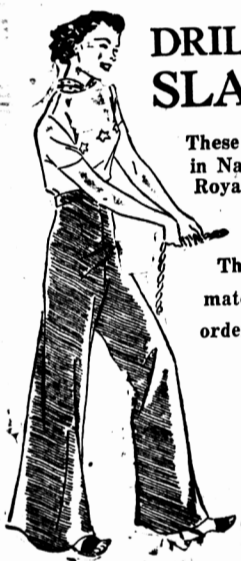

LIBERAL DELEGATES RETURN HOME

Convention Of The Twentieth Century Liberal Association Closes.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 2—After what was regarded as a very successful convention members of the Twentieth Century Liberal Association were on their way home today. The convention closed late yesterday with a review of the government's accomplishments in alleviation of unemployment and stimulation of external trade, by Hon. J. L. Daley, Minister of National Revenue.

Saturday morning was spent in discussion of organization matters and resolutions on a wide variety of subjects and closed up the work of the two-day convention which opened Friday. Prime Minister Mackenzie King, who Friday night was guest speaker at a banquet of the Association attended reception with delegates given by Senator Carrine Wilson.

The convention at its final meeting dealt with 19 resolutions on varying subjects. Implementation of the report recently made by the Commons special committee on radio at the present session of Parliament was urged in one moved by Odette Lapointe, honorary vice president and adopted unanimously. Another urged Canada should have power to amend her own constitution.

The convention, however, looked coldly on a proposal the Dominion government should raise money by lotteries and sweepstakes held from time to time in order to contribute to unemployment and health insurance schemes. While urging strongly upon the government inauguration of a program of social legislation embracing unemployment and health insurance and general superannuation on a compulsory and contributory basis, the convention did not favor sweepstakes and lotteries as methods for raising funds. An amendment moved by Melville Pearce, of Winnipeg, to delete the lottery and sweepstake provision was approved, and the resolution as amended carried.

The convention took under advisement a resolution from the New Brunswick association approving the principle of consumers' cooperation. It asked that federal and provincial governments "acquaint the people of this Dominion with the economic advantage of voluntary organization in consumers' cooperatives." The resolution will be studied.

LEMON AND GINGER JAM

Ingredients: 4 lemons, 3 pints of water, 1 ounce root ginger, 1/2 lb. preserved or crystallized ginger, sugar.
 Wash and thinly slice the lemons, put into a preserving pan with the water and the root ginger tied in a muslin bag. Boil gently for an hour. Strain through a jelly bag and allow an equal weight of sugar. Heat the liquid, add the sugar and preserved ginger, and bring to the boil. Mother Of Five Convicted Of Murder

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DORCHESTER, Eng., June 2—(C. P. Havas)—Mrs. Charlotte Bryant, 33-year-old mother of five children, was confronted today with the prospect of being hanged. She was convicted yesterday of poisoning her husband. No definite date was set for the execution of the sentence.

An autopsy performed after Frederick Bryant's mysterious death last Dec. 22 revealed traces of poison in his intestines. The comely widow protested her innocence throughout the trial, but a jury found her guilty of putting the poison in her husband's food.

Mrs. Bryant was the third woman condemned to death in Great Britain this year. One was executed, while the sentence of the second was commuted to life imprisonment. All knowledge of the trial and their mother's conviction has been kept from Mrs. Bryant's five young children. They have been placed in an orphanage.

Morgenthau Appeals For Huge Loan

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, June 2—Treasury Secretary Morgenthau applied to the American public tonight for the largest peace time loan in the history of the country—\$2,050,764,400.

He asked for \$800,000,000 secured by 15-18 year bonds bearing interest at the rate of 2 3/4 per cent, and \$400,000,000 on five year notes bearing 1 3/8 per cent interest.

At the same time he offered either of these securities in exchange for \$89,816,400 of 1 7/8 per cent notes maturing June 15, and for \$364,138,000 of 3 1/4 per cent notes maturing next Aug. 1. Both new securities will be dated June 15.

The amount of the new loan over and above the amount of maturing securities is \$1,000,000,000—constitutes additional cash, and will swell the public debt to \$32,643,000,000.
