

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

ARTILLERY INSPECTION.—Nos. 1 and 2 Companies Garrison Artillery were inspected yesterday afternoon, and made a splendid showing. Today there is big gun shooting at Keppoch.

A SIDE SHOW.—They started a fire in Montreal a few nights ago to show the fire chiefs' convention how well things were managed in the impetuous city, and burned down the Montreal laundry.

EXCURSION TO NEW GLASGOW.—The excursion to New Glasgow yesterday was attended by about one hundred persons, and was thoroughly enjoyed. The Citizens' Band was in attendance with a good programme. The steamer arrived at Charlottetown on return about 11 o'clock last evening.

HAIL FELLOW WELL MET.—The Yarmouth Light says: Among others who came on S. S. Yarmouth yesterday to have a good time in our town were three young men from Boston. They were fast friends, probably because their vocations had thrown them together often. They were a bartender, a policeman and an undertaker.

EXHIBITIONS.—We have received copies of the prize lists of the Exhibitions for Prince and King's Counties. The former was printed at the Journal and the latter at the Examiner office, and reflect credit on all concerned. The Prince County Exhibition will be held at Summerside on Thursday, 4th October, and the King's County Exhibition at Georgetown on Wednesday, October 3rd. The fall races under the auspices of the King's County Exhibition Association will take place on the Driving Park at Georgetown, on Tuesday, 2nd October.

ELECTRIC LIGHT.—The tenders received by the Summerside Town Council for lighting the town by electricity are to be submitted at a public meeting of ratepayers to be held on Monday evening next. The correspondent of the Guardian reports that there were seven tenders received, one for plant, two others for gas and boilers. The Canadian General Electric Co., of Toronto, was for incandescent light only \$6,000 and for incandescent and gas lights \$7,150. The other tenders for engine and boiler ranged from \$2,000 upwards making a total cost of about \$10,900.

AFTER A CERTAINABLE.—This morning, before the Master of the Rolls, the presiding judge at chambers, an application was made for a writ of certiorari on behalf of Edward Thorpe, of the conviction and punishment of the defendant on the 12th of August, 1894, by the Stipendiary Magistrate Haszard, for an alleged infringement of the Scott Act. The application was made by Mr. Stewart, Q. C., and J. J. Johnson, on behalf of Thorpe, and after hearing the counsel's argument Judge Hodgson reserved his decision. We learn that the only point raised on the application to-day was whether or not there was any evidence upon which the Magistrate could make a conviction for a sale within the Act.

THE MARKET.—The market today was fairly well attended. Business was brisk with the supply good. Following are the principal quotations:—Butter, 20 to 22 cents; blueberries, 4 to 5 cents; cabbage, 3 to 6 cents; chickens, per pair, 35 to 45 cents; eggs, 9 to 10 cents; fowl, 50 to 55 cents per pair; gooseberries and peas, per quart, 10 to 12 cents; turkeys, each, 90c to \$1.20; hats, 25 to 30 cents; potatoes, 38 to 40 cents; oats, 44 to 45 cents, and mackerel 6 to 8 cents each.
