It has been suggested, whether facetiously or seriously we cannot say, that the Provincial Government should resign in the near future and seek a new mandate from the electorate.

Canadians will take satisfaction in noting that the Canadian Red Cross Society has donated \$50,000 towards funds being raised in the United States for relief of the sufferers from the hurricane and tidal waves which brought death and destruction to the Louisiana coast.

"There is," comments the Ottawa Journal, "a kinship in disaster which takes no account of frontiers. Louisiana is far from Canada, and we see it, if at all, only as far-ranging tourists, but when the need arose we were ready, through our Red Cross, with the only practical assistance we could give the stricken area."
