Islander Appointed To CBC Radio Post

John A. MacEwen of Charlottetown has been appointed to the position of Presentation Officer for radio station CBA and CBI, it was announced in Halifax today by Captain W. E. S. Briggs, CBC Director for the Maritimes.

Mr. MacEwen was educated at Prince of Wales College, University of British Columbia, University of King's College, and did post-graduate work at Dalhousie University where he obtained his Master of Arts degree. He began working in radio on a part-time basis when he joined the staff of CFXY in Charlottetown in 1942. He joined the CBC in 1948 and was transferred to CBI, Sydney when that station first opened. After moving to CBC Halifax in 1951, Mr. MacEwen held the post of Talks Producer for nine months. In 1952 he returned to Charlottetown and then rejoined the CBC as a news editor in the fall of 1954. He has held that position until his present appointment.

Mr. MacEwen's responsibilities as Presentation Officer will include the immediate supervision of all Halifax program staff, including announcers, producers and record and music library staff. He will also be responsible for observance of CBC standards of writing in productions originating from CBC Halifax. In addition his duties will involve close co-ordination with the Regional Program Director.

Mr. MacEwen is married to the former Nora Louise Downe of Charlottetown. They have one son, John William. Mrs. MacEwen is the daughter of William Downe of 126 Upper Prince Street, Charlottetown. Mr. MacEwen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. R. MacEwen, reside at 86 Upper Prince Street in Charlottetown.
