TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Official News. OTTAWA, Oct. 13. A meeting of the Privy Council will be held to-day, when the position of the clerks of the Interior Department, under accusation of irregularities, will be finally decided. It is expected that all will be reinstated except Burgess, the Deputy Minister, who will be exonerated. Then his resignation, which has been before the Council for some time, will be accepted, and he will enter the service of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Heavy Loss of Cattle. LONDON, Oct. 13. The steamer Stora King, which arrived at Dundee to-day, sailed from Montreal on September 26th with 630 cattle on board, stalls for which were erected between decks. A big storm was encountered during the voyage, and 152 cattle were lost.

Trotting Races. YARMOUTH, N. S., Oct. 13. The free-for-all trotting stallion race, was won by Sir Garnet. The three minute class was won by Sir Brenton, owned by Mr. Fellus, of Kentville. Nellie Bashaw won in the 2:40 class in two straight heats, and the free-for-all was won by the New Brunswick horse, Stanley.

Vessels Condemned. WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. A telegram from Port Townsend says that the trial of the schooners Ethel and LaNymph, before the United States Court at Juneau, for violating the modus vivendi, resulted in the condemnation of both vessels.

Baroness Macdonald. OTTAWA, Oct. 13. Baroness Macdonald has returned from her British Columbia tour. Her health, which was broken by the long vigil during her husband's illness, and the grief she suffered at his death, is restored.

Marine Disaster. BOSTON, Oct. 13. The steamer Daphne, of St. John, from that port with lime and laths for Boston, struck Broad Sound on Sunday. The crew had a narrow escape, after three hours' exposure.
