Boost Pensions For Some Retired Federal Employees

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government has decided to boost pensions for retired federal employees receiving below normal payments.
Finance Minister Fleming announced to the Commons Monday that pensions to former civil servants, RCMP and armed forces personnel, and their widows and children, are to be increased by amounts up to \$640 a year.
They will be retroactive to July 1 and the extra money should start appearing in pension envelopes by the fall, he said.
He told the Commons that the government proposes to insert a special item for this purpose in its spending estimates this session. Legislation to make the increases permanent will be introduced at the next parliamentary session.
Cost of the government's decision, welcomed by all parties in the Commons, will be about \$3,300,000 a year, the minister said.
HIGHEST RAISE
The highest amounts will go to pensioners who retired in 1945 or earlier — before salaries in the three branches of government service were hoisted and living costs began to rise.
The government, like many other Canadian employers, provides retired employees with pensions based on earnings and length of service. For each year of government service, the retired employee receives two per cent of the salary he earned before retiring.
It follows that the longer an employee worked, the more his pension is.
Mr. Fleming said that before 1945, pensions of the three groups involved were such that there was no strong demand for an increase.
MORE REPRESENTATIONS
"Since 1946, however, a combination of the rise in the cost of living and in the general salary levels of the three groups in the public service has led to increasing representations not only by retired members of the three groups but by members of the House and the various civil service organizations."
Welcoming the announcement, Opposition Leader Pearson asked whether there is any intention of doing the same for pensioned employees of the publicly-owned CNR.
Mr. Fleming said they come under CNR jurisdiction.
The highest increase will be to the pensioner who retired in 1945 or earlier and now is receiving \$2,000 a year. He will get a boost of \$640.
PENSION CEILING
Only pensions not now exceeding \$3,000 annually will be raised and the top for a pension plus increase is \$3,000. For the widow, the maximum pension qualifying for a raise is \$1,500; for a child \$300 and orphaned child \$600.
The rate of increase for persons who began receiving pensions after 1945 will be scaled down according to retirement date and length of service.
Mr. Fleming estimated the increases will affect some 15,000 persons—12,000 former civil servants, 2,500 former members of the armed forces and 600 former RCMP officers. These figures include widows.

Bible Society Sermon Heard

Rev. M.C.P. MacIntosh, secretary of the Nova Scotia auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, gave a most interesting address on that organization in Alberton United Church Sunday evening.
After tracing the story of its organization by a group of English laymen in 1804, he pointed out that now the Bible, or parts of it, is being printed in 1100 languages.
The function of the Church, he pointed out, is to spread the good news of the gospel, and the Bible Society is a vital part of the Church's life and work because it helps the church to fulfill its mission.
Increased missionary interest and activity mean more demands upon the society and these demands are greater than it is able to meet because Bibles are supplied at much less than cost to people who are unable to pay the full price. Besides providing the Bible in many languages for the countries of the world, it makes sure all Canadians have the Bible. For the blind it is supplied in Braille and also on recordings.
In closing he said the gifts of its friends to the Bible Society will speed the advance of God's Kingdom.

Seismograph Survey In West Prince Reported Completed

The Seismograph Corporation of Calgary have completed the geophysical survey of the area between Bloomfield and North Cape, P. E. I. license area No. 1, and leave tomorrow for Murdochville in the Gaspé Peninsula where they will carry out similar work also for the California Standard Oil of California.
The twelve man crew, under direction of Robert Harlow, John Bunker and Eric Manchev, arrived in Alberton on July 6th. Results of the survey are not expected to be released by the company at the present time.
Mr. B. Graham Rogers, geological officer of the Provincial Department of Industry and Natural Resources kept in close touch with the West Prince survey.
