Poor Growing Conditions May Help P.E.I. Growers

Poor growing conditions elsewhere have benefited P.E.I. potato growers before the same thing might well happen again this year, it is indicated in a release made available to The Guardian Thursday by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board.

The Middle West areas are reporting trouble, with reports of 20 to 30 per cent damage coming to us from Central Wisconsin, dry in the northern part of the state. Michigan is still dry, Indiana's early crop is reported smaller. Prospects in the Red River Valley are not the best.

The extreme heat and lack of rain which has hit the Middle West and Mid-Atlantic States, is causing concern regarding the coming crops. The Tabb reports explain.
