## The Fishery Award.

The Opposition organs have not much to say respecting the Address of the Legislature to the Governor General in Council. The worst they can say is that the Government might have done better. Well, perhaps they might. But then it must be remembered that the Davies Administration permitted the money to be paid over to the British Government into the hands of the Governments of Newfoundland and Canada without even hinting that the Island had a just claim to a part of the Award. It was with the British Government that the Island negotiated respecting the Fishery clauses of the Washington Treaty. It was, therefore, to the British Government that the Island should have, in the first place, preferred its claim and stated its case. But Mr. Davies allowed the opportunity to pass by—the money to be distributed—without a word or a sign that Prince Edward Island was specially interested. Certainly, it does not lie with the organs of the Opposition to raise a furor because the Government and Legislature, led by Mr. Sullivan, have only framed and passed a most convincing memorial—setting forth the ground of our claim—to the Governor-General in Council.

Respecting this memorial, the King's County Advertiser has a well-pointed and able article. We quote:—

"We are proud to see our representatives taking such a manly and patriotic stand in this matter, and we hope that their praise worthy efforts will be crowned with success. They have placed the legality of our claim before His Excellency in a succinct and convincing manner, and we do not see how the General Government will avoid giving us the amount we claim.

There is no substantial ground for dispute, and if the General Government should unwisely decide unfavorably in our regard, we must carry the matter still further and lay our claims at the foot of the Throne of Her Majesty, where the weak are treated as fairly as the strong and powerful. The value of our fisheries and the equity of our claim is no secret to the Home Government, as every tittle of evidence produced at the Halifax Commission has pointed conclusively in our favor and established the justice of our claim. It was very clearly demonstrated before the Halifax Commission that the fishing grounds around this Island are (and were at the period for which we claim recompense) the most prolific and profitable within the limits of the Dominion. Any one sailing round this island during the busiest of the fishing season will see abundant proof of this; will see that a larger number of Nova Scotia fishing vessels ply their business around our coasts than will be found fishing in their own waters. The United States fishermen visit our fishing grounds in larger numbers than they do the shores of Nova Scotia. Every inch of the whole circuit of our coast teemed with fish, which were thrown open to strangers by the Treaty of Washington to the great detriment of our Island fishermen. In view of these facts we have a claim and a right to a larger proportion of the Award than any of the British American Colonies, although Newfoundland has received the lion's share. One and a half million dollars, at least, should be put to our credit. The yearly interest on this sum at five per cent., when added to our yearly income, would find its way to the pockets of those who alone are entitled to it. To appropriate any of our share of the Award to the improvement of the Inland or River Fisheries—M. Fortin's Utopian scheme—would be a direct and unpardonable injustice to this Province, which is the heaviest loser by the spoliation of our Fisheries. Besides to improve the Fisheries along the sea-coast, as Dr. Fortin proposes, would not profit the present generation of fishermen in this Province, and is doubtful if it ever would benefit this Island.

## The Policy of Economy.

The Dominion Government are carrying on the policy of economy regardless of the outcries of the inmates of the Cave of Adullam. It is said that a large reduction in the number of extra clerks in the civil service at Ottawa will take place on the first of next month.

## Supposed Loss of Two Daring Navigators.

Goldsmith, the Swede, and his wife, who some time ago announced that they would cross the Atlantic and continue the voyage round the globe in a boat 18½ feet long, have been missing some ten days. They were last seen off Boston light at five o'clock in the afternoon of June 1st. As they have not been heard from since, it is feared they are lost.

## HALIFAX.

A DISPATCH says the question most engaging public attention at Halifax just now is the state of the civic finances. A very large number of people are unable to pay their taxes and there is general distress, but still the volume of civic taxation is increasing. The evening papers advocate a public meeting of citizens to discuss the situation. The Recorder says:—

"The real disease lies in the assessment. Everybody knows the system is very bad; could not be worse. It is only industry that is taxed in Halifax. A man may be receiving an income of thousands of dollars yearly and not pay a cent of taxation if he is a boarder, while his neighbor, who employs a score of men, is heavily taxed. A scheme could be devised which, while it would bear harshly on none, would reduce the rate of taxation to lower than one per cent."

Halifax is, we believe, the only city of Canada in which the principle of levying taxes is now the same as it is in Charlottetown.

## Rascals Abroad.

## Save Me from my Friends.

It has been generally remarked and fully proven that history repeats itself—and sometimes in very singular cases. But it is not usual for "writings" to be copied unless for a special object. What object the writer in the Patriot of the 12th inst., had in view when he penned the article bearing that classical heading "Mean and Cowardly," we know not. But we do sincerely hope for the sake of the good feeling we bear toward the late Provincial Auditor (F. W. Hyndman) that it was only a mere accident. The writer after insinuating that the charge made by the EXAMINER against the Provincial Auditor were not correct says:

"The most upright man that ever lived could be ruined with the utmost ease if before a tribunal accusations couched in the following terms could have the least weight: 'If any payments made in 1878 are not charged to that year, &c.'"

Compare the above with the following from Sir William Draper's letter to the printer of the "Public Advertiser" of Feb. 1769 in defence of Lord Granby in "Junius" attack on that nobleman and you will see the simile. Sir W. says:

"I could by malicious interrogations disturb the peace of the most virtuous man in the kingdom; I could take the decalogue, and say to one man, 'Did you ever steal? &c.'"

Let us apply "Junius'" reply to Sir W. to the wounds of the "most upright man" and to the writer in the Patriot. Junius says:

"Do you then really think that, if I were to ask a 'most virtuous, upright man' whether he ever committed theft, it would disturb his peace of mind? Such a question might discompose the gravity of his muscles; but I believe it would little affect the tranquility of his conscience.

"Examine your own heart, Sir Wm., (F. W. H.) and you will discover that your approaches and enquiries have no power to afflict either the man of unblemished integrity, or the abandoned profligate. It is the middle compound character which alone is vulnerable; the man who, without firmness enough to avoid a dishonorable action, has feeling enough to be ashamed of it."

"In mercy to him let us drop the subject." Ghosts of "Junius" and "Sir Wm." forgive us!!

## Sitting Bull.

According to a despatch which from Fort Keogh, Sitting Bull is tired of living in Canada. He has gone with six lodges to the Saskatchewan country, but before leaving he advised his people to come to terms with the Government of the United States and return to that country. It is to be hoped that his warriors will take his advice and that the Chief himself will do the same. The presence of so many war-like Sioux in Canada is a constant source of anxiety and trouble to the Government and may at any time lead to difficulties and to expense. Whether Sitting Bull is tired of Canada or not, Canada is certainly tired of him.

## Is Lager Beer Intoxicating?

This question is to be settled in the Courts at last, the case of Samuel Whitebone being taken as a test case. Whitebone sells lager beer on Canterbury street, and refused to take out a liquor license, contending that the beverage is not an intoxicant. The Police authorities maintain that the beer is an intoxicant, and the Chief of Police makes information against Whitebone for selling liquor without license. John Frederickson joins the Chief in the information to show that the beer contains a certain amount of alcohol.

The case was taken up before the Stipendiary Magistrate. Dr. Tuck appeared for the prosecution and C. A. Stockton, Esq., for the defence. Mr. W. F. Best, the chemist, was put on the stand, and deposed that he made an analysis of beer obtained in Whitebone's saloon. It contained 8 per cent of proof spirits. Proof spirits has to be divided by 1.76 to make alcohol. After this had been done it would equal 4½ per cent of alcohol. The residue is a solution of malt extract and hops and grain.—St. John Globe.

## Sir Garnet Wolsley's Appointment.

Every is glad to learn that Sir Garnet Wolsley has been appointed to the supreme command of the army in South Africa. He practically supersedes not only Lord Chelmsford, but Sir Bartle Frere, at least so far as the authority of the latter in Natal and the Transvaal is concerned. The Government have done as much as lay in their power to make the fall of these unfortunate officers easy; too much indeed for general approval; and if had not become apparent that the administrative difficulties were greater than Lord Chelmsford could surmount, it is probable that he would have been retained in the command. Sir Garnet Wolsley is expected to make short work of the business, and his experience in irregular warfare where the management of the transport and commissariat departments is of more importance than strategy or tactics, will stand him in good stead. However, he will not reach Natal before the end of June and it is quite on the cards that the war may be finished by that time.

## Rifle Match.

MILTON AHEAD—GREAT ENTHUSIASM.

A very interesting shooting match took place at Milton Rifle Range yesterday, the 12th, between James Dover and Ronald Crawford of No. 6 Company, Charlottetown, against Geo. Essory of No. 1 Company, Royalty, and Henry Hooper of Charlottetown Engineers, for a sum of ten dollars a side. At the finish the score stood as follows: Milton Team 195 points; No. 6 Team 189 points. Thus giving the Milton boys a victory 6 by points.
