The average velocity of the wind last night was thirty-five miles an hour. It began from the west, veering to south and southwest.

Wednesday, 21st inst., will be declaration day. Sheriff Robertson will begin the counting of ballots at ten o'clock, in the Supreme Court room.

The ambulance corps of No. 2 Co., (Methodist) Boy's Brigade, will meet for drill at a quarter to five this afternoon in Kindergarten Hall.

Three drunks figured at the police court this forenoon. James Savidant was fined \$5 or 30 days, John Bell \$4 or 20 days and Samuel Morrison \$2 or 10 days.

It is understood that a Provincial election will be held next month, probably on the 13th or 14th. A meeting of the Executive will be held on Monday evening at which the date will probably be fixed. There was not a quorum at the meeting called for last evening.

This morning at 8 o'clock the anniversary requiem mass for the deceased members of the League of the Cross was celebrated by the spiritual director, Rev. J. F. Johnston, in the chapel in St. Joseph's Convent. The League of the Cross choir assisted, and the Rev. Theodore Gallant presided at the organ.

Duffy.

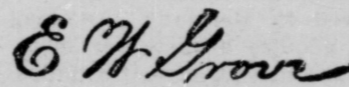

What action was taken at this latest meeting could not be learned. Rumors have been current for some time that the price of steel billets would be advanced to \$40 a ton. The present price is \$18.50.

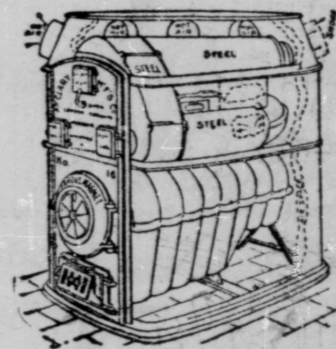
