Will Recall Hazardous Experience To Mr. Howe

CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z. (CP)—When Canada's Trade Minister C. D. Howe reaches Christchurch next Tuesday he is due for a shock. He will learn the inside story of a hazardous wartime landing and realize he was closer to death than he imagines.

Howe is on a goodwill mission to Australia and New Zealand. J. S. O'Neil, navigator of a plane which took him from London to Prestwick, Scotland, during the war, plans to tell him the background to the trip.

O'Neil has a high regard for the Canadian minister. Here's why. "On Oct. 22, 1943," he says, "I was with No. 24 squadron in England. I was given the emergency job, with a French pilot, Lieut. Paul Ferris, of taking Mr. Howe from London to Prestwick.

"When we arrived at Prestwick, a 40-knot wind was blowing, which meant we had to land upwind. Unfortunately the upwind runway was

under repair and there were oil drums on it.

WHERE IS AYR?

"Eight miles away was another airport beside the town of Ayr, Paul, who could not speak English very well, kept saying he wanted to land 'Er'.

"Neither I nor the control tower realized he meant Ayr, so they brought him in. He almost came down on top of an oil drum. I lifted him off at 20 feet and by this time he had become rather rattled.

"Paul kept shouting over the inter-com that there was no choice but 'Er', so we made a circuit and they brought him in for a crosswind landing, which was very difficult under the high wind conditions.

"The tail came down first. We

"It must be realized that Mr. Howe had been torpedoed in the Atlantic on the way to Canada and has spent more than two weeks in an open boat.

"He could have made a lot of trouble, but he stepped calmly from the remains of the plane, remarked, 'It was a — good landing', and walked away. I thought he was a very fine fellow to take such an attitude in the circumstances."

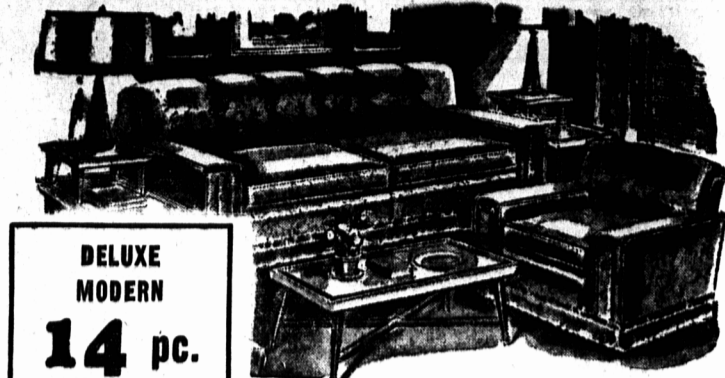
