WEDNESDAY EVENING.—Rev. Mr. Campbell's lecture on the Columbian Exposition and the Naval Review.

THE MARKET.—The New Year's market today was not largely attended, with the supply inside large, but outside of produce and pork small and hardly up to the demand. Prices inside ruled high, with a good demand, but outside were unchanged. Pork is still firm at 51c, oats at 33 to 34c, and hay at 28 to 32c. Geese sold at from 75 to 80c, turkeys at 75c to \$1.50, ducks at 60 to 70c, and fowl at 50 to 60c.

DRY'S FORTY IR.—There will be a concert and basket social in the Lyceum on Wednesday, Jan. 9th, the money realized at a week will go towards the fund of St. Vincent's Paul Sewing Society. The Society is doing a good work in the way of providing clothing for the poor, and its splendid programme is being prepared for the occasion. ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The Rev. Father Burke, who came into town by Saturday's train preached two eloquent and practical discourses at St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday morning at the 8.30 and 10 o'clock Masses. The reverend gentleman's sermon at the ten o'clock service, preached from the Gospel of the day, is spoken of as one of the best Gospel expositions made in the cathedral for some time. Particularly delicate and fitting as to everyone acceptable, were Father Burke's references to the late Premier. We are unable to get this portion of the sermon, as our reverend friend seemed so that he had no note or extension of any part of his discourse, having spoken throughout with but a moment's preparation and to fill a gap.

Upwards of one hundred of the brethren attended the service, headed by the City Band, and the procession which followed the house was one of the largest seen here for some considerable time. The body of Alexander Wright, son of the late Nathaniel Wright, of Bellevue, was also interred in the People's Cemetery yesterday afternoon.
