EGG AND SHRIMP SALAD

Salad greens, 1 1/2 cups cooked or canned shrimp, 1/2 cup diced celery, 2/3 cup cooked peas, 6 hard-boiled eggs, sliced, 1 teaspoon salt, dash of paprika, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup mayonnaise, 3 tablespoons cream, 2 tablespoons chili sauce, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon finely chopped chives.

Prepare and arrange salad greens in a salad bowl. Mix together the shrimp, celery and peas and place in alternating layers with the hard-boiled eggs. Sprinkle each layer with a little of the salt, paprika and the lemon juice. Thin the mayonnaise with the cream and add the chili sauce, the Worcestershire sauce and chives. Chill and serve with the salad. Serves six.

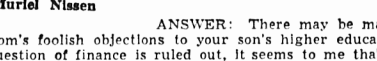

HEARING AIDS A BOON TO THE HARD OF HEARING

I write frequently about the great boon hearing aids have been and are to the hard of hearing. I often meet acquaintances and friends about their hardness of hearing and who are now in responsible positions, able to hear and converse freely about everything.

In a previous article, I gave much of the credit for this great advance in the hearing aid industry to nonprofit organizations that give practical aid to the hard of hearing by helping them to select the type of hearing aid best suited to their particular difficulty.

From a communication received from L. A. Watson, president, American Hearing Aid Association, I did not give enough credit to the manufacturers of hearing aids. He states, "I should like to give you some facts from an independent survey of hearing aid users in the United States made by the Hearing Foundation about a year ago. This survey included users of different makes of hearing aids and encompassed several thousand users."

This survey asked hearing aid under the frame. A semi-dry method of cleaning is preferred.

Worm Killer

To exterminate earth worms in potted plants thrust unburnt sulphur matches, heads down, into the earth around the plants. Use from two to six matches, according to the size of the plants.

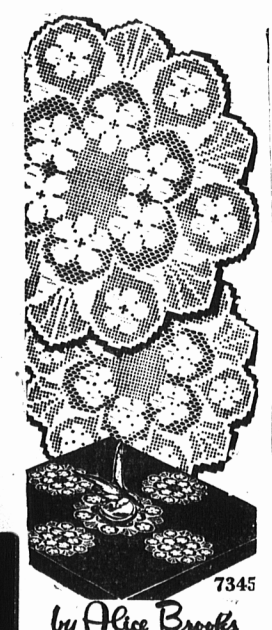
